UD MUSIC FACULTY MEMBERS PRESENT EVENING OF BRASS MUSIC

DAYTON, Ohio, October 23, 1987--The Music Division of the University of Dayton's Performing and Visual Arts Department will present performances by two UD faculty members, Richard Chenoweth and Andrew Millat, on Sunday, November 1, at 8 p.m. in the Kennedy Union Boll Theatre on the university campus.

Andrew Millat is principal trombone of the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra and performs with the Dayton Philharmonic Brass Quintet. An instructor of trombone at UD, he holds a B.M. degree from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory and an M.M. from the University of Northern Colorado. For the recital, Millat will perform Sonata Vox Gabrieli by Stjepan Sulek and Elegy for Mippy II by Leonard Bernstein. He will be accompanied by Joan Forbes.

Richard Chenoweth, who founded the Miami Valley Horn Club, also performs with both the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra and the Dayton Philharmonic Brass Quintet. He has served as hornist in the orchestra of the Santa Fe Opera for the past 15 years. At UD he teaches horn and conducts the University Symphonic Wind Ensemble. Accompanied by Phil Farris, Chenoweth will perform Ries's Introduction and Rondo, Mozart's Concerto No. 3, and Joseph Rhineberger's Sonata. Chenoweth will also present the premiere performance of Steven Winteregg's Vignettes for horn, flute, and piano. He will be accompanied in this piece by his wife, Marianne, on the flute, and the composer, Steven Winteregg, on the keyboard.
