The Sisters of the Congregation of St. Felix of Cantalice (Felician Sisters) began their process of "kneading bread for LIFE" – the life of Christ and his Church – on November 21, 1855 when ten young women joined together to alleviate conditions of strife in Poland. This first religious congregation of women in Poland to combine social action with a life of prayer and joy-filled sacrifice was but an extension of the blend of love and contemplation that was so much a part of the life of its foundress Mother Mary Angela.

Like their patrons, St. Francis of Assisi and St. Felix of Cantalice, the Felicians concerned themselves with the poor - orphans, the aged, and the uneducated. Mary - the lowly maidservant whom all generations shall call blessed - became the pattern for their approach to co-redemption.

In 1874 five Felicians emigrated to America, responding to appeals for educational social service. Presently, over 3000 Felician Sisters are involved in this leavening process of bringing the love and peace of Christ to those in need. The life of each Felician - whether in Europe or North or South America - continues to converge on the Eucharist - the BREAD of LIFE.

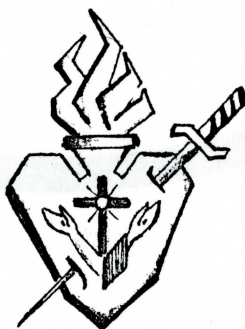
