THE MARIAN LIBRARY

UNIVERSITY OF DAYTON

Established in 1943, the Marian Library is today the world's largest and most comprehensive collection of printed materials on Mary, the Mother of God and of all the faithful, and related fields. Published holdings, numbering near 100,000 books and pamphlets in over 50 languages (from the beginning of printing up to the present day), include the following:

- 6,000 items from the 15th through the 18th centuries (including exegetical commentaries, sermons, prayers, poems, treatises on theology and iconography, histories of shrines and of cultic forms);
- the Clugnet Collection with more than 6,500 works on Marian shrines;
- a general Reference Collection containing primary texts (the Migne patrologies, *Acta Sanctorum*, *Patrologia Orientalis*, *Monumenta Germaniae*, etc.); studies of the Bible, Church history, general theology, liturgy, iconography, and religious anthropology; bibliographies of the Reformation, of religious orders, and of various epochs of printing;
- over 175 scholarly and popular periodicals related to Marian studies.

There are various collections of other Marian materials—including an indexed clippings file (over 60,500 items), statues, prints, music, slides, postcards, Christmas cards, Nativity sets (more than 900 crèches from around the globe), stamps, medals, recordings, audio- and videotapes.

The special collections of the Marian Library complement the resources available in the main library of the University of Dayton. All the holdings of the main library are available in the university's online catalog; nearly two-thirds of the Marian Library's holdings are currently included there also (accessible through the internet), with more records being added each day. At present, the university's online catalog contains 87,955 records for volumes in Religion and Theology, 64,367 records for volumes in History, and 104,267 records for volumes in Language and Literature. A number of fine theological libraries in the Dayton area can be easily reached.

THE INTERNATIONAL MARIAN RESEARCH INSTITUTE (IMRI)

UNIVERSITY OF DAYTON

The wealth of the Marian Library has been made available to students by means of a regular academic program. In 1975, the International Marian Research Institute was founded to facilitate and encourage Marian studies in the United States and abroad. IMRI is affiliated with the Pontifical Theological Faculty Marianum (Rome).

Since its approval by the Sacred Congregation for Catholic Education, IMRI is empowered to bestow the licentiate (S.T.L.) and the doctorate (S.T.D.) of sacred theology, with specialization in mariology. Students also may earn a certificate in Marian Studies or a master's degree in religious studies, with specialization in mariology, from the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Dayton (offered in a joint program). IMRI also offers a program of Guided Studies.

As one of the world's few centers for mariological studies, the International Marian Research Institute is also involved in the promotion of interdisciplinary studies, continued scholarly research, and religious art. Auditors are admitted to the academic program. Some scholarships are available to IMRI students, as are fellowships for scholars engaged in independent research.
