## TWO DOCUMENTARY PAPYRI1)

#### 1. List of Payments

P.Mich.inv.64 Plate IIb 10.75 x 14.2 cm.

mid second century B.C.

Written on recto across the fibres. There appears Kollesis ca. 4.5 cm. from the bottom.

The document records a series of payments. Each date is followed by a payment, but there is no indication of what the payment consists. Presumably the sums listed refer to drachmai. Also there is no indication of the person(s) to whom or by whom the payments were made. For a similar document of the same period, see *P.Lond.* I 25 (p.163).

The papyrus can be assigned to the middle of the second century B.C. on palaeographical grounds. The hand shows some similarities with P.Lond. I 24r (163 B.C.) and 21 (162 B.C.), nos.9 and 10 respectively in R.Seider, Paläographie der griechischen Papyri I (Stuttgart 1967). Therefore the year 2 in the first line of our document probably refers either to that of Ptolemy VI Philometor (180/79 B.C.) or of Ptolemy VI Philometor, Ptolemy VIII (Euergetes II) and Cleopatra II (169/8 B.C.).

#### 2. Penthemeros Certificate

P.Cairo SR 3049.88

6.6 x 7.8 cm.

This papyrus, one of a large and varied group designated P.Cairo SR 3049,<sup>2)</sup> is typical of the receipts given to certify the performance of five days labor on the dike corvée. It follows without fail the expected formulaic pattern of such certificates. The text was written by four different hands. The first two provided the formulaic content (regnal year and days worked) and are characterized by extreme *Verschleifung*. The third hand, a large and sprawling one, has inserted the name of the corvée performer. At the end of the certificate is the signature of the καταςπορεύς in a small and neat bureaucratic hand.

Φολ(ήμιος): This canal name appears variously in the genitive as Φολήμιος or Φολήμιος; cf. Sijpesteijn and Worp on P.Fay. descr. 366.5 (BASP 16 [1979] 132). The canal is most often mentioned in connection with Tebtunis; in addition to this text cf. SB I 5124.194ff. and 269ff., X 10544, and probably P.Mil.Vogl. V 247 (cf. N. Lewis, BASP 6 [1969] 25). It is referred to in conjunction with Euhemeria in P.Ryl. II 211-212 and P.Stras. 249e (cf.  $Pap.\ Lugd.$  Bat. XII 67), and with Theadelphia in P.Mich. XII 654 and SB XII 11032.  $P.Fay.\ descr.$  287 also mentions this canal but the place on behalf of which the corvée was performed is unknown.

#### Translation

Year 21 of Imperator Caesar Titus Aelius Hadrianus Antoninus Augustus Pius. Work has be done on the dikes for this same year Pauni 13-17 on the Pholemis Canal on behalf of Tebtunis by Orsenouphis son of Orsenouphis whose mother is Taos (?). I, Athenodorus, have signed.

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
## THE HOMER-HYPOTHESIS P.OXY, 574 VERSO: AN ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

In "Fragment of a Homer-Hypothesis with no Gods," ZPE 56 (1984) 1n.1, I listed other Homer-summaries on papyrus, including P.Oxy. 574 verso, which I said had not been identified before as a Homer-hypothesis. Actually, Franco Montanari had properly identified this papyrus in ZPE 48 (1982) 89-92, correcting Grenfell and Hunt's text and noting the parallels with the manuscript hypotheses. I regret my oversight. 1)
