Not like the standard orientation of today, but the chance for upper-classmen to have their meeting with any entering freshmen. Things weren't strictly academic by any means.

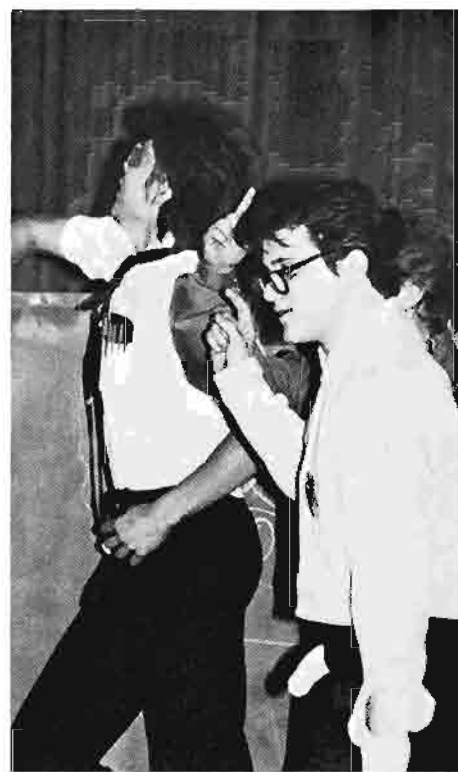
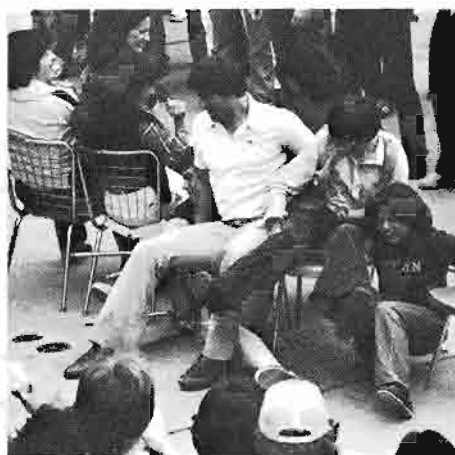
The returning students had freshmen doing a lot of crazy things and wearing some strange clothes and various assortments of food and drink.

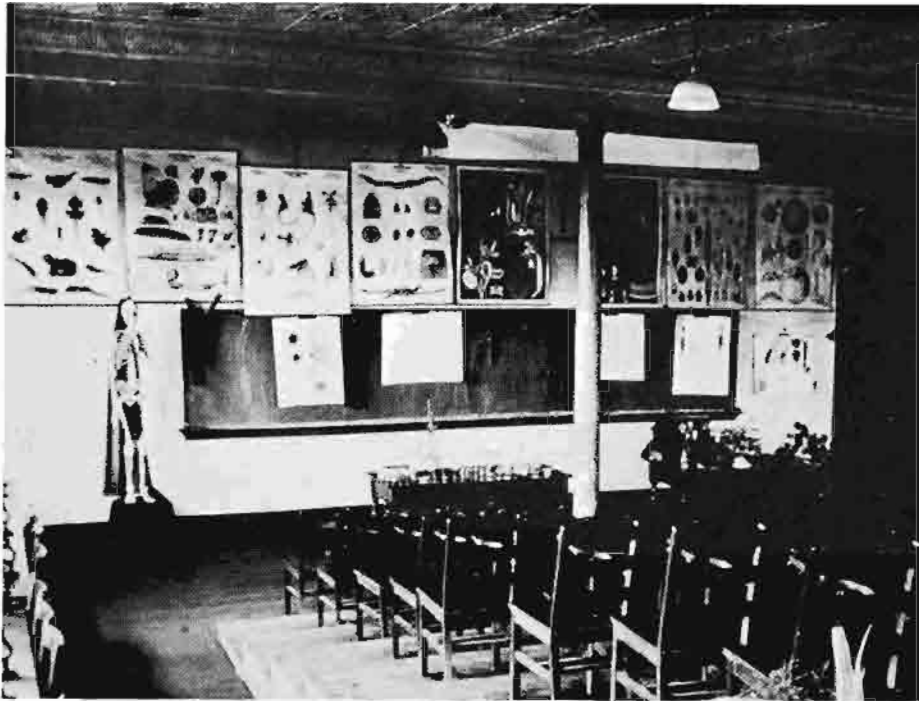


The freshmen initiation evolved into the different weeks of riotous fun and wild times today.

and the king and queen skits for Turnabout and Homecoming all constitute the crazy times that college life brings about. The fantastic fun is here to stay.



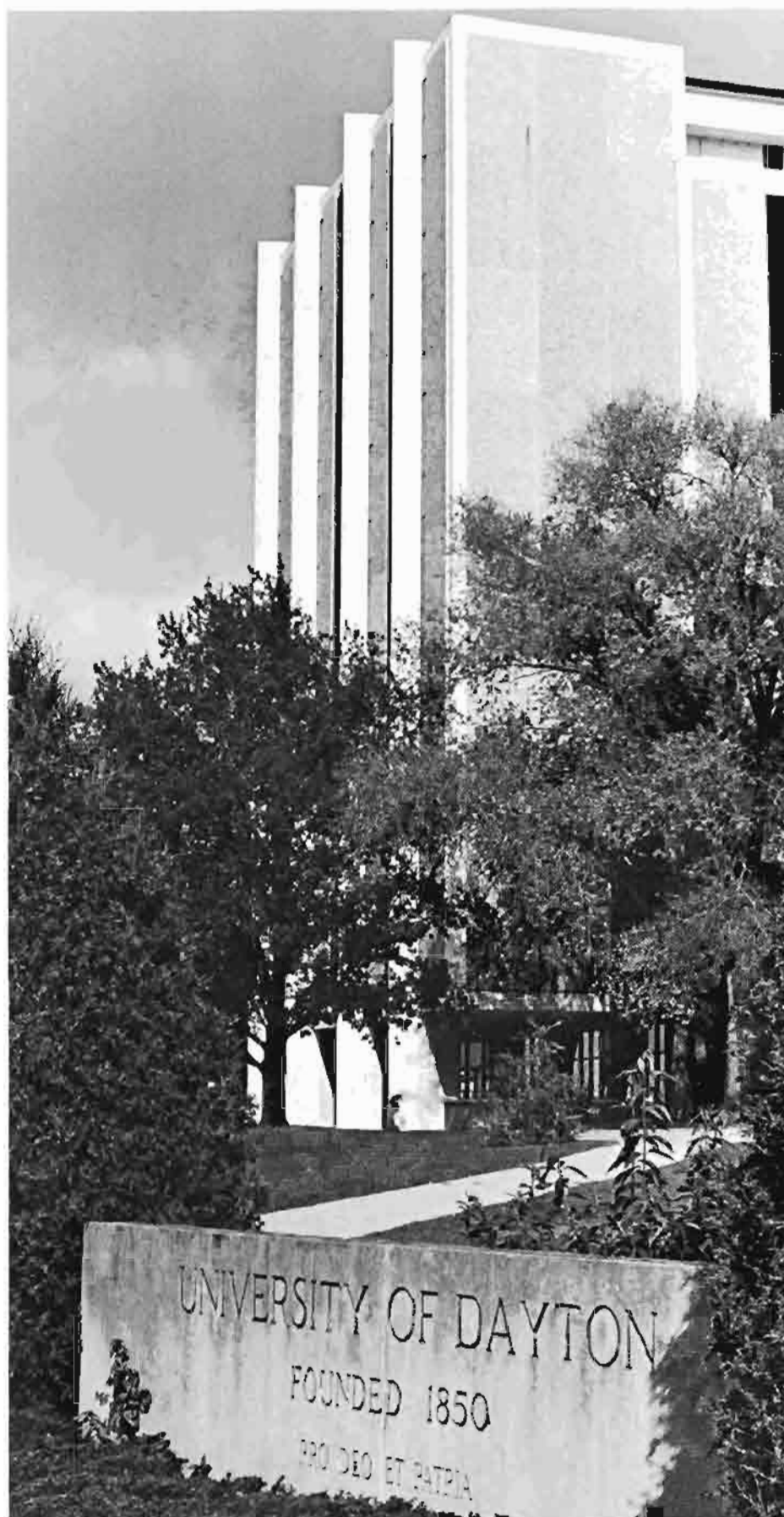




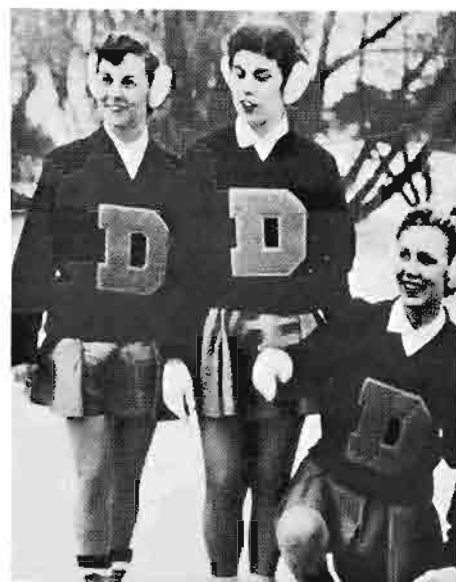

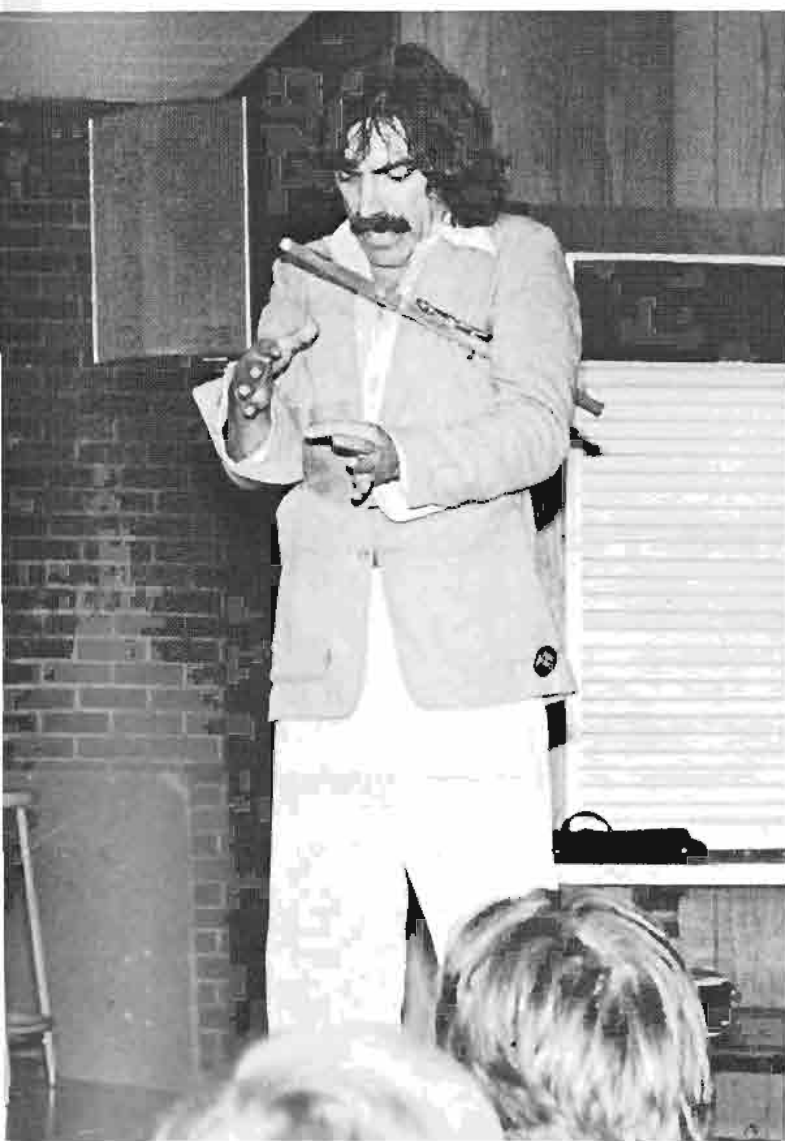
JOINT RUSH

CAMPUS CARNIVAL





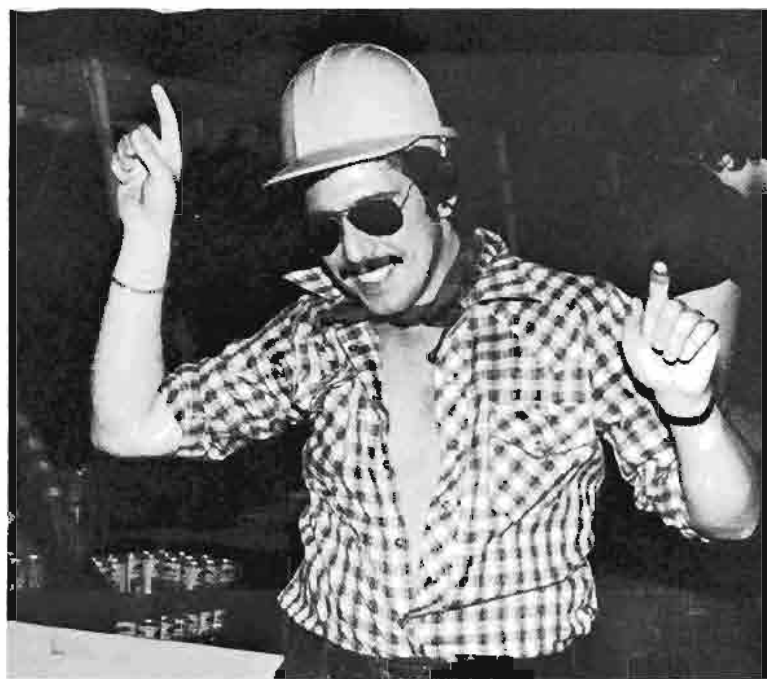
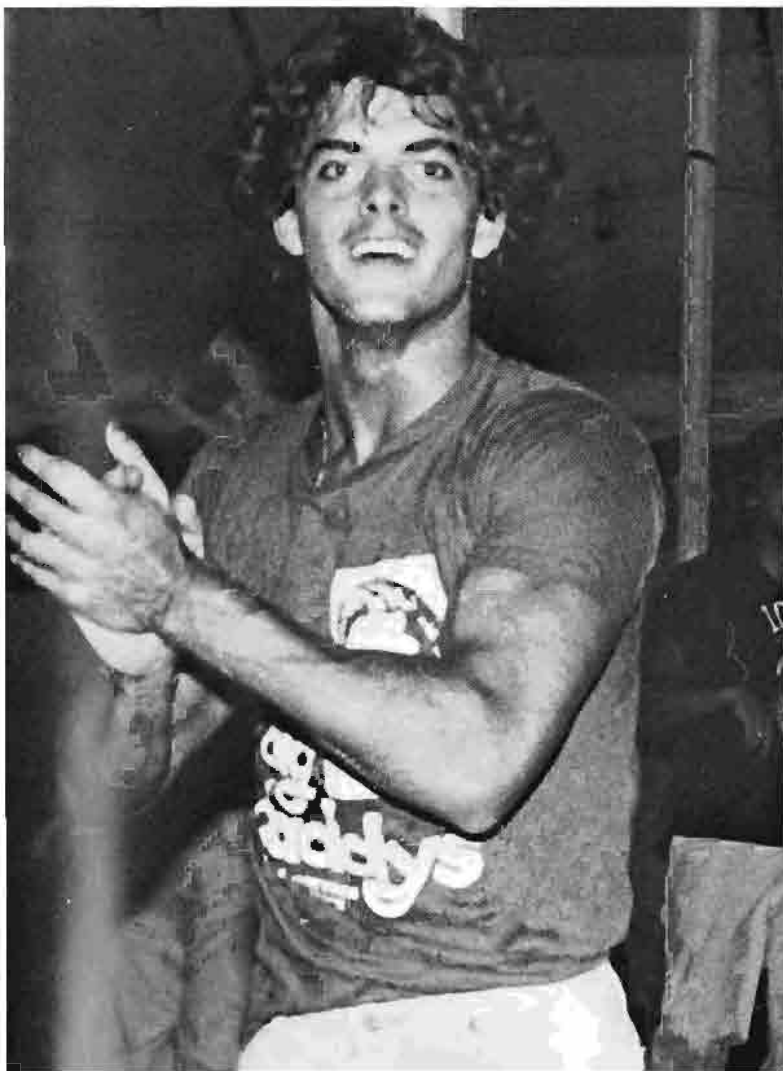

CIRCUS DISCO

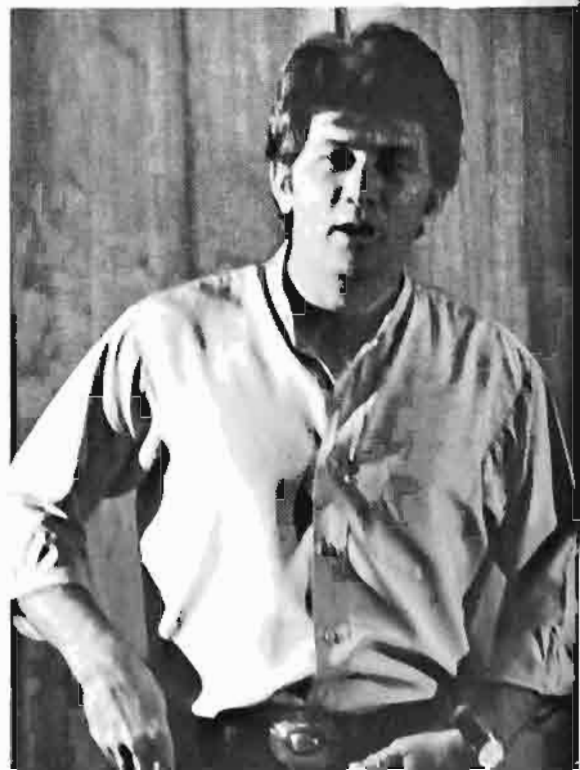

MARTIN SHEEN



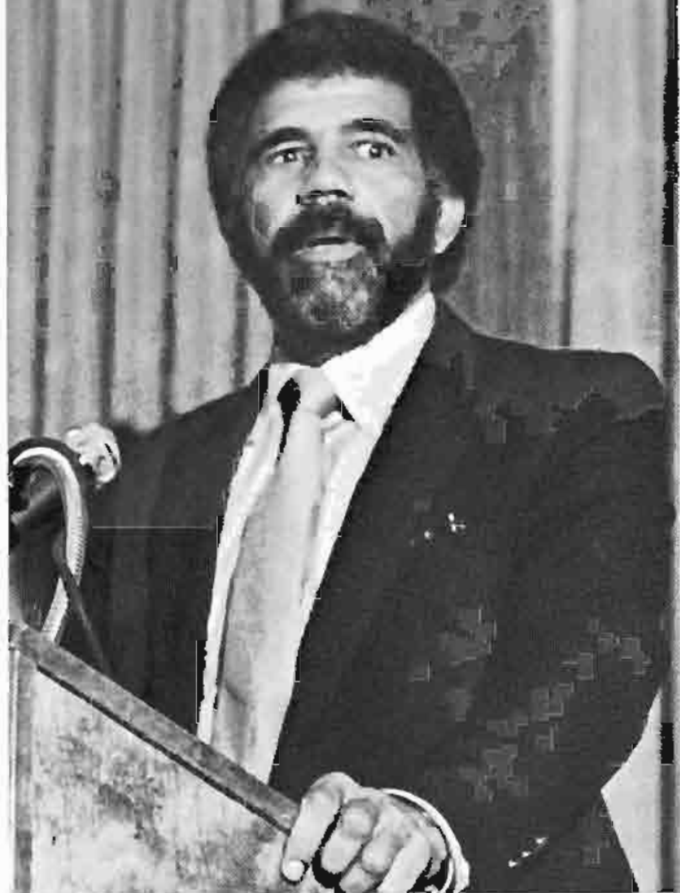
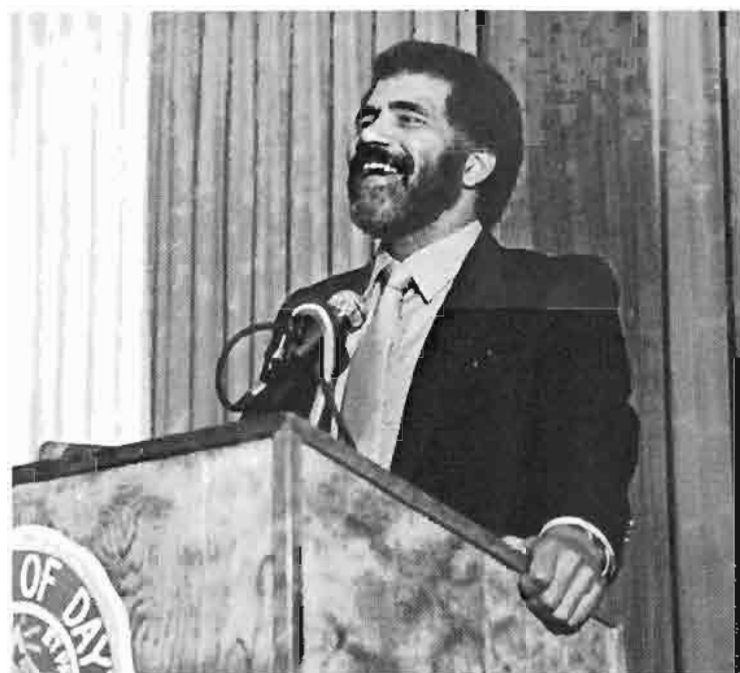

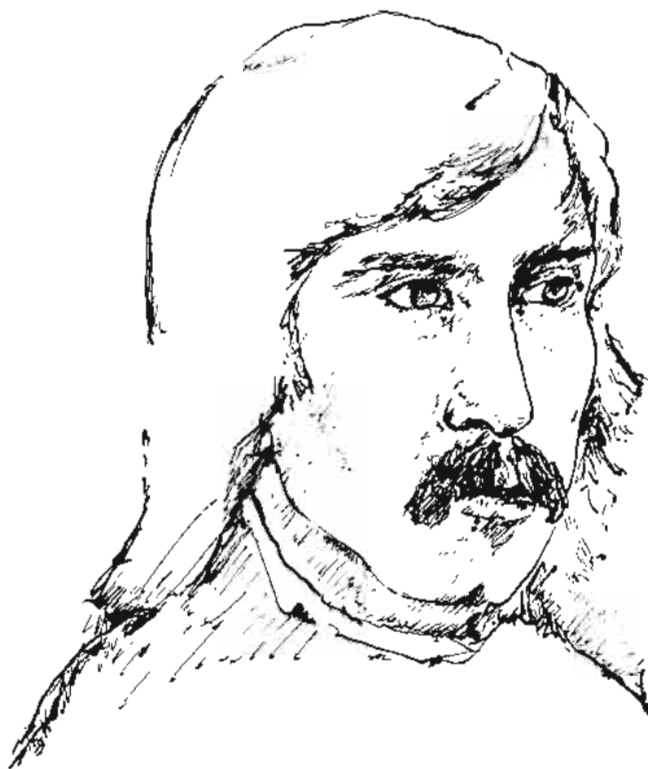
EDWARD BRADLEY



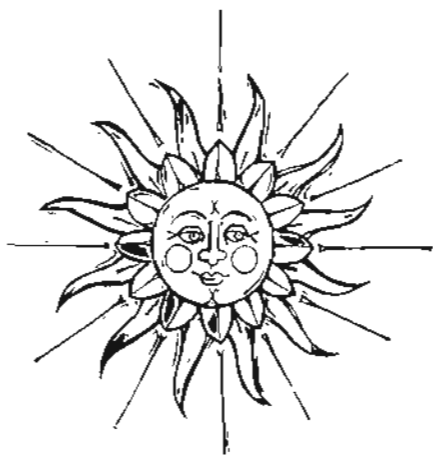

EDWARD ALBEE



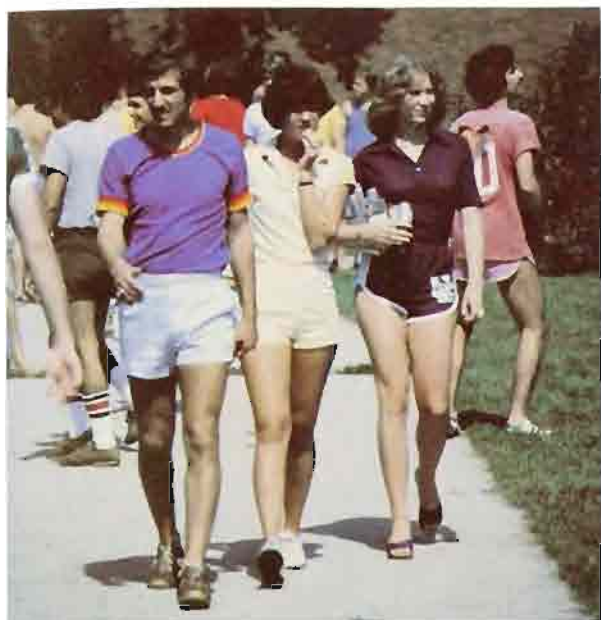

QUEEN SKITS

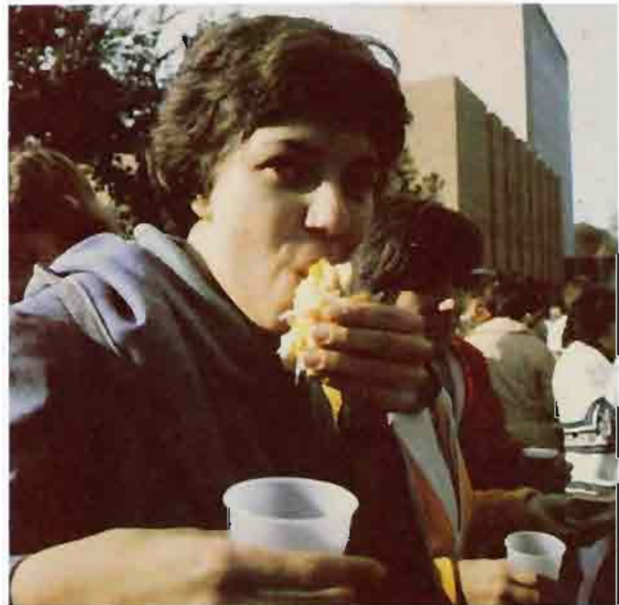

Once again the Kennedy Union Ballroom witnessed another successful cultural celebration this year as the International Tea got under way.

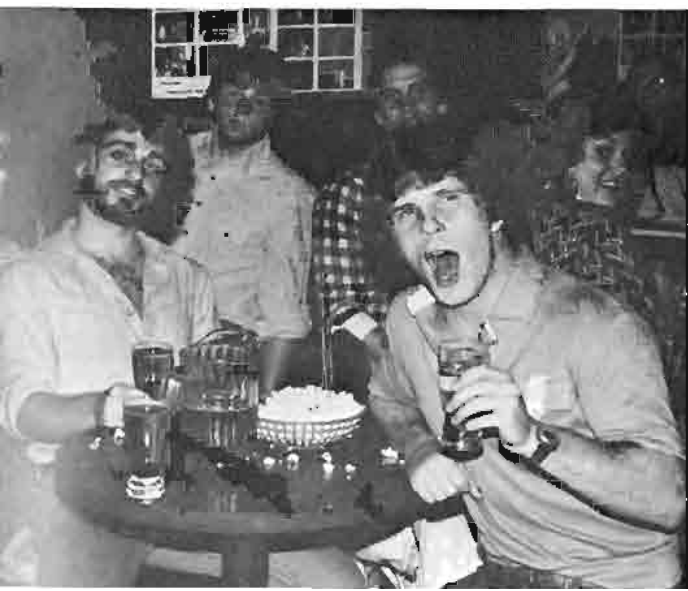
The introduction of the Homecoming Queen Candidates officiated the opening of the program.

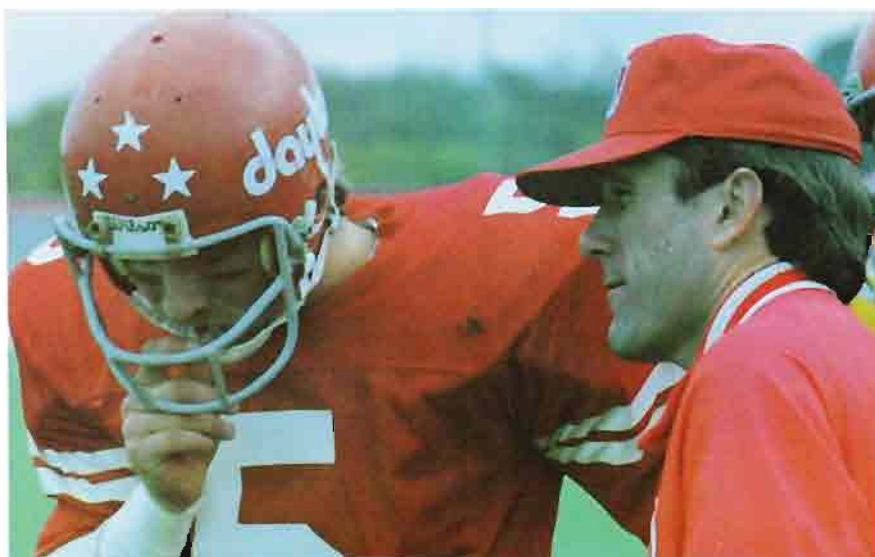
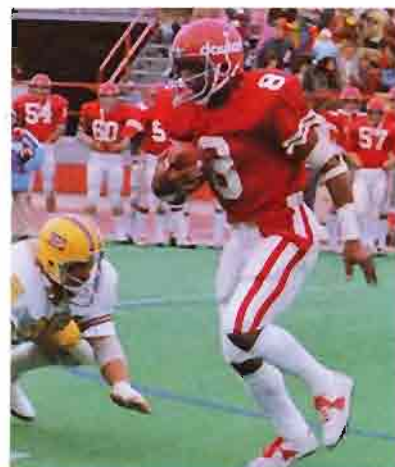
THE PRIDES OF DAYTON

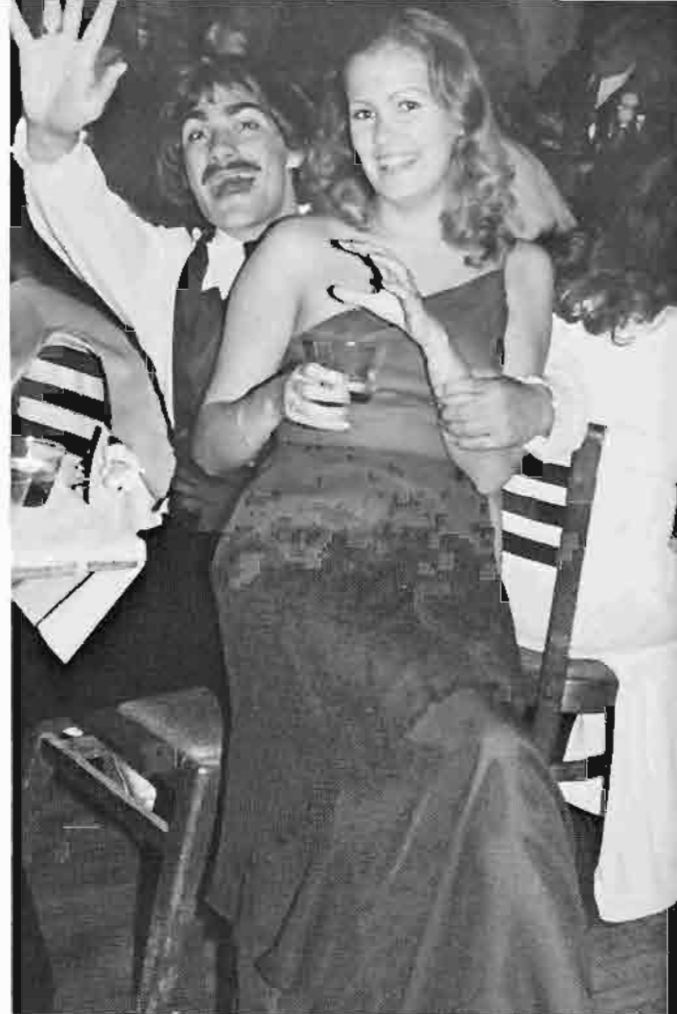

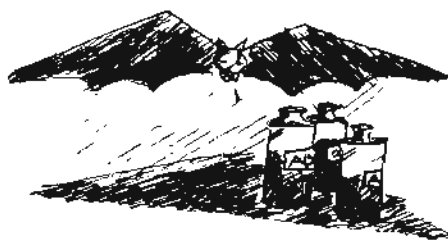




HALLOWEEN

DICK GREGORY

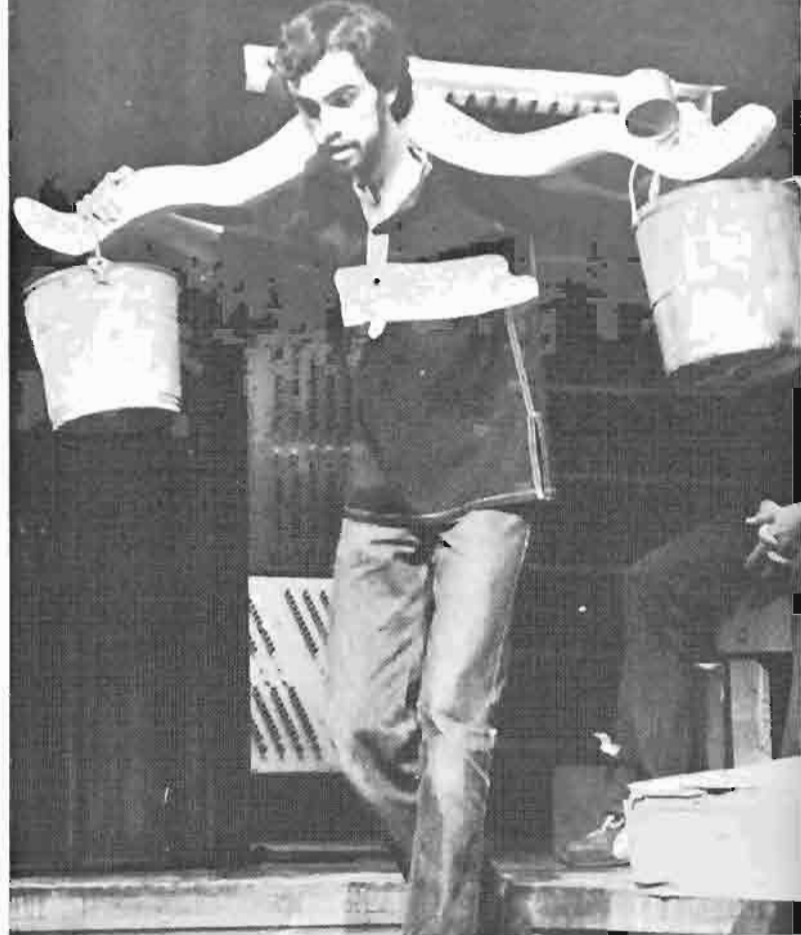

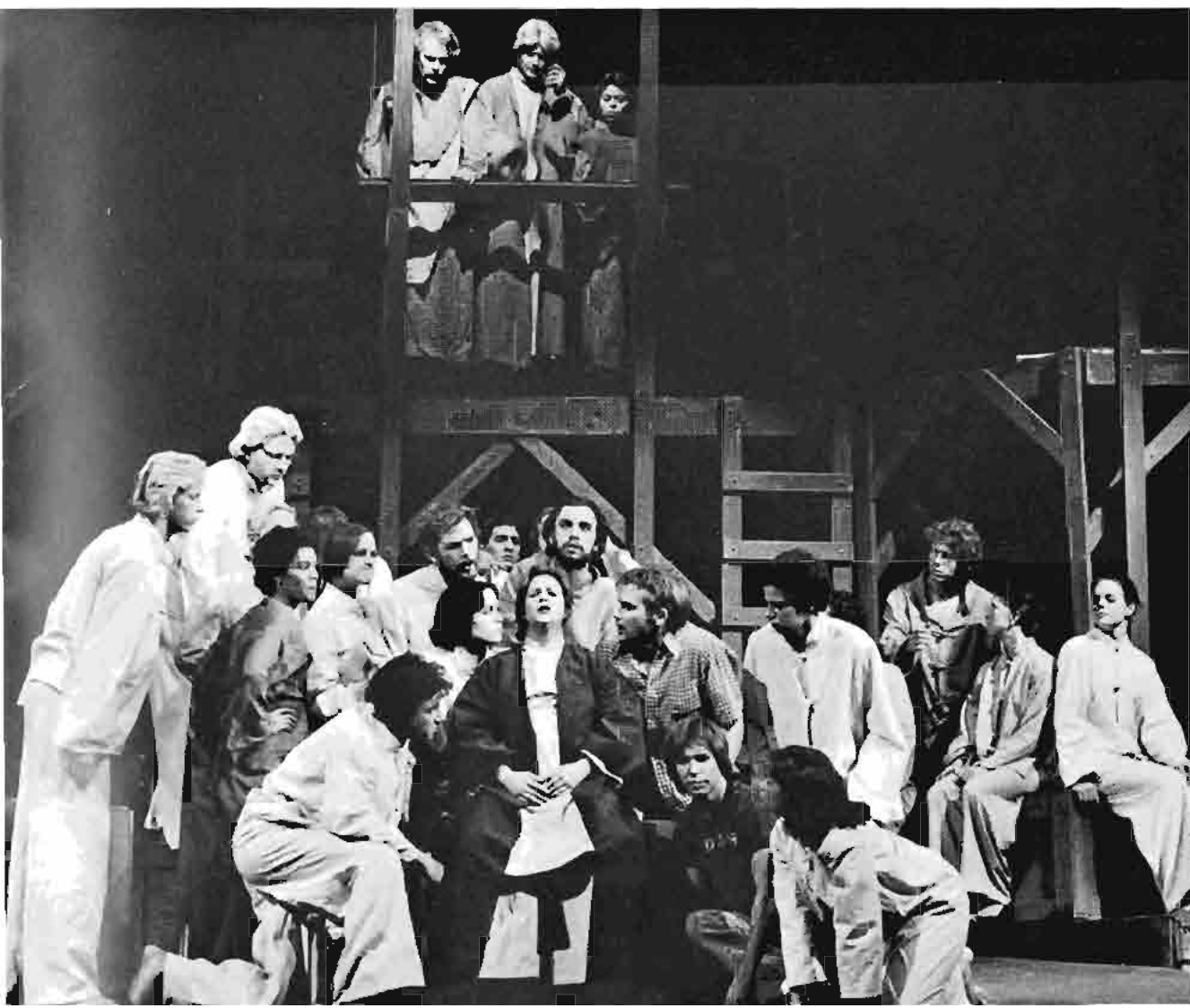
THE GOOD WOMAN OF SETZUAN

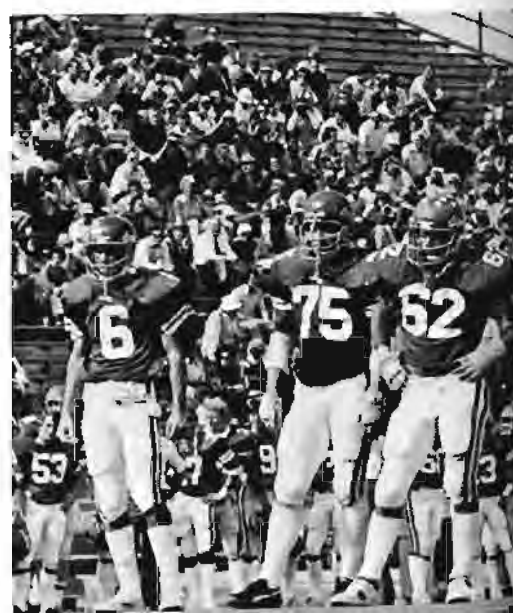
BELOW: David Lee Dutton emerges from his den in the sewer pipe as he portrays the part of the water seller in *The Good Woman of Setzuan*.

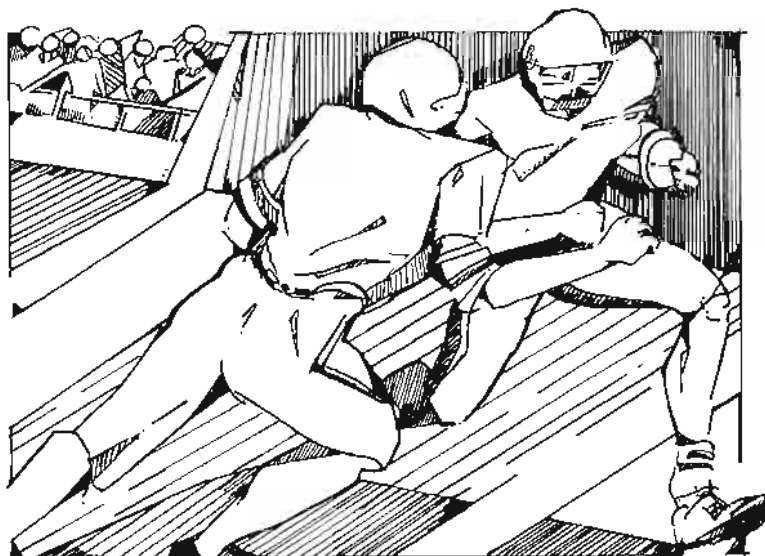

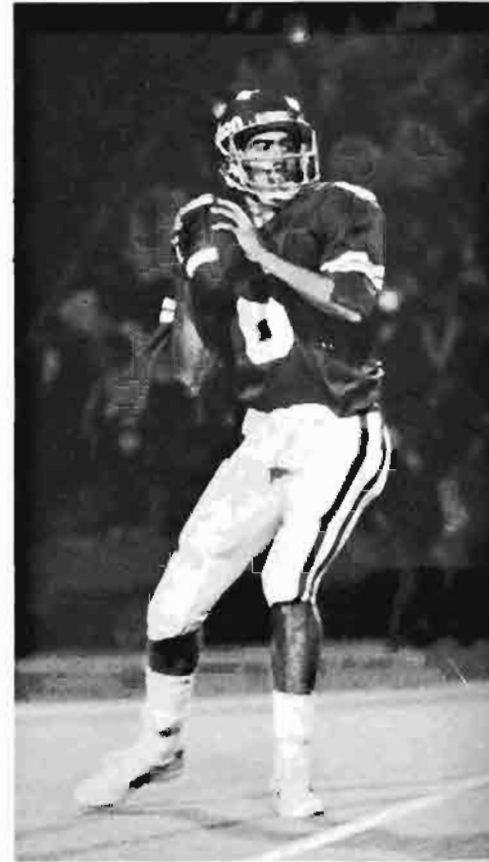
"New faces, same results." This motto, taken from summer practice, was the dream of the Flyer Football coaching Staff. New faces — incoming freshmen and stronger,

quicker players from last season — working with last year's lettermen to produce the same winning results as the 1978-79 season. The Flyers, once ranked fifth in the nation with a chance to make the Division III playoffs, played eight weeks of outstanding football. In the ninth week, Dayton's dream of a National Championship was shattered as the Flyers' top two quarterbacks were injured on consecutive series. In this game against Liberty-Baptist, the Flyers lost starting signal caller Jim O'Hara with a broken collarbone and backup Scott Terry with a separated shoulder. Coach Carter said, "not only was this a physical loss, but also a great psychological loss; both O'Hara and Terry were tremendous team leaders."

The 1979-80 team did better than was expected as Carter explained "that the success of the team did not lie solely on one man, but on a team concept." What is in store for next year? Carter said that the loss of twelve seniors is not detrimental; twenty-three juniors are returning. The 1980-81 team has the potential to be as good, if not better than this year.

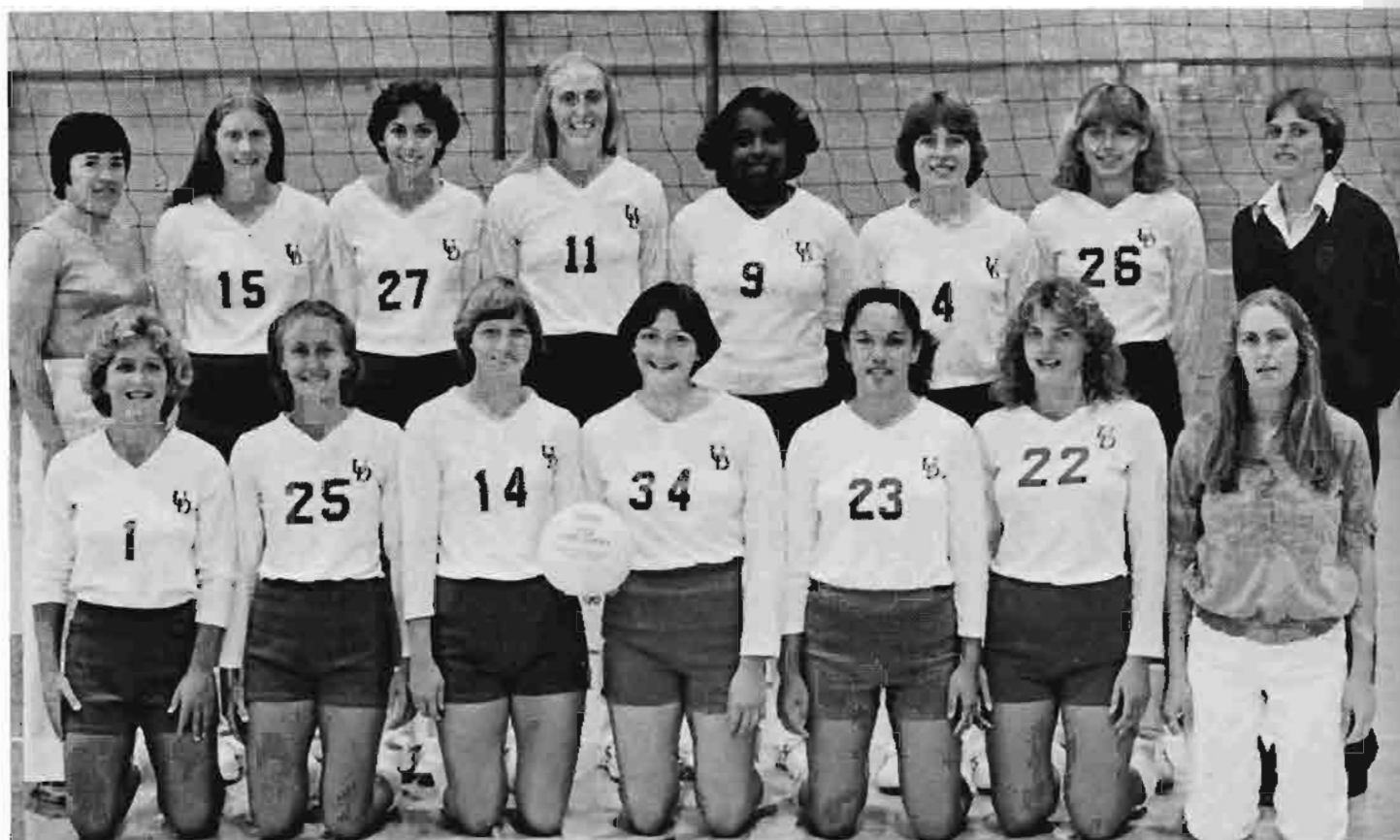

"This is the best team ever at UD," remarked Coach Elaine Dreidame. Because of their playing ability, skill, and strategy control, the UD Spikers finished fifth in the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Division II National Championship with a 49-9 record.

They also captured first place in the University of Missouri at St. Louis Invitational, the State, and the Midwest Regional Tournaments. This is Dayton's third time as a fifth place winner in national competition, yet the 1979 Flyers are considered very special by Coach Dreidame.

Along with the successful season as a team, significant individual accomplishments were earned. Senior hitter Ann Meyers and junior setter Linda Sargent were named to the All Tournament team at the State Championship, with Meyers receiving the same honor at the Regionals. A spot on the Nationals elite squad earned Meyers the grand slam of tournament team selections. She was also nominated for the Broderick Award which annually goes to the nation's top female college athlete.

Unfortunately, the team lost several key players for next year. But Coach Dreidame believes that although the team will be young, there is much potential for yet another successful season.



FIELD HOCKEY





The women's field hockey team started out the season with a bang, winning their first five games. Their first defeat of the season came in their match against Eastern Kentucky University, 1-0. "Their goal was a fluke," Coach Pat Jayson said, "It bounced off an unlevel piece of ground."

The Flyers then came back with two more wins. Their 1-0 win against top ranked Northwestern University was the highlight of the season. In the Flyers victory against Wittenberg, Jackie Schmerge lead the scoring with 10 goals, the highest of this season, and only 2 goals off the school record, held by junior Connie Duffin.

The Flyers ended up their season winning the first Division II State Championship game.

Coach Jayson said she had been a little disappointed with the even 9-9-1 record, and the dismissal of 6 players halfway through the season for road trip violations. But she said, "It looks good for next year."

This years University of Dayton soccer team faced a tough 18 game schedule which included national runners-up Indiana, Akron, Ohio State and Cincinnati.

Injuries to key players and mistakes plagued the 1979 Flyers. After a strong win over Notre Dame, the boosters lost four in a row. The Wittenberg game was the start of a "second season" for the flyers with a 3-1 victory. But things soon changed when the Flyers suffered a 2-0 loss to visiting Cincinnati. - Production of *Godspell* and *The Clouds*.

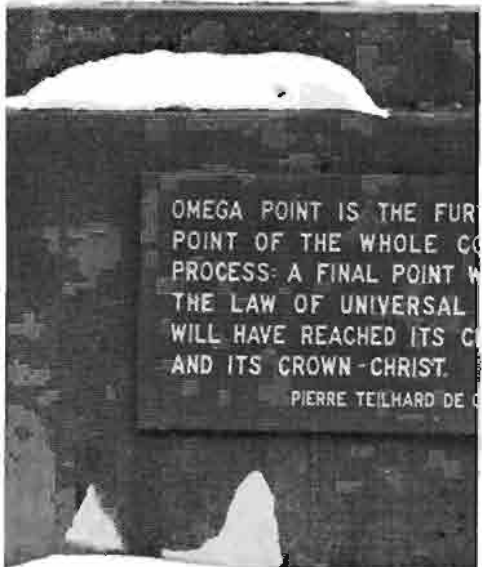

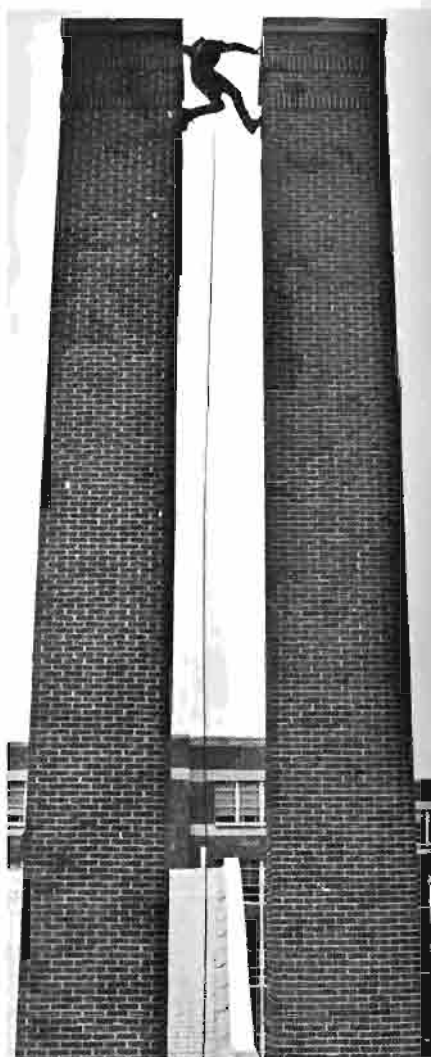

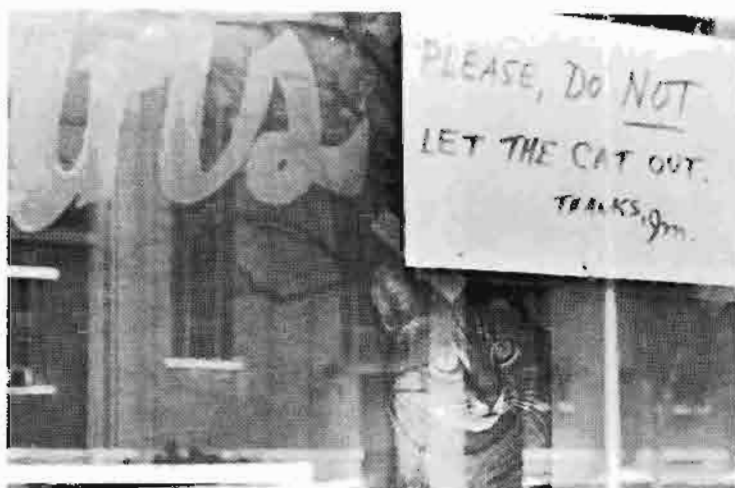

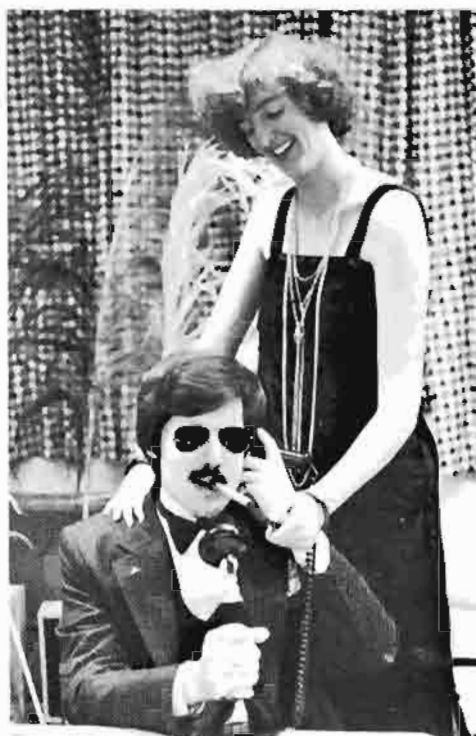

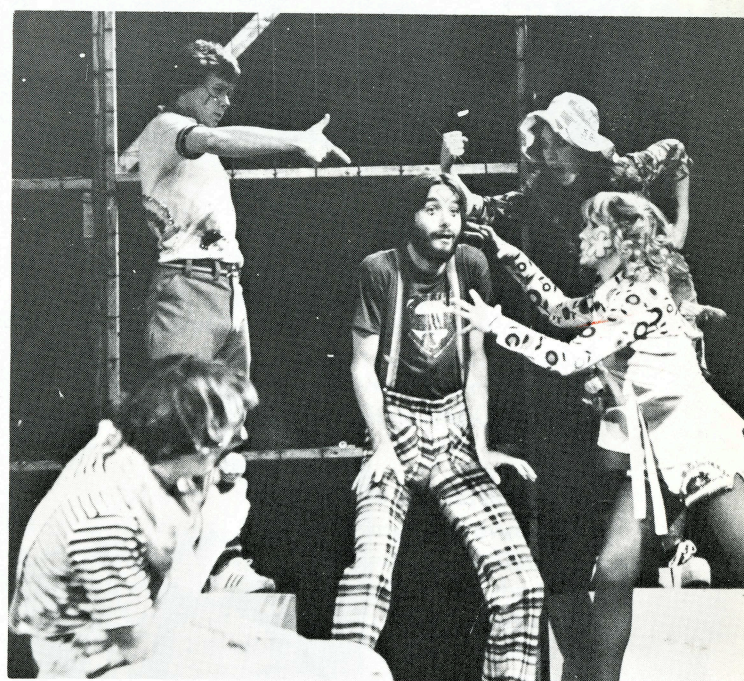
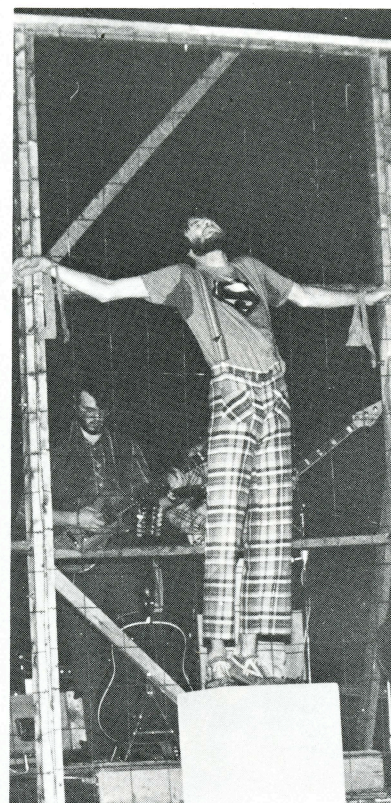
GODSPELL

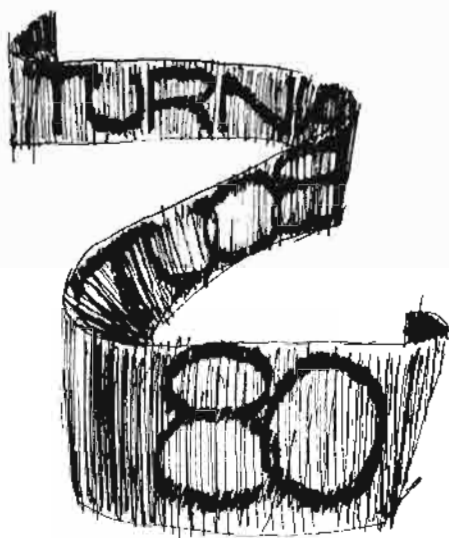

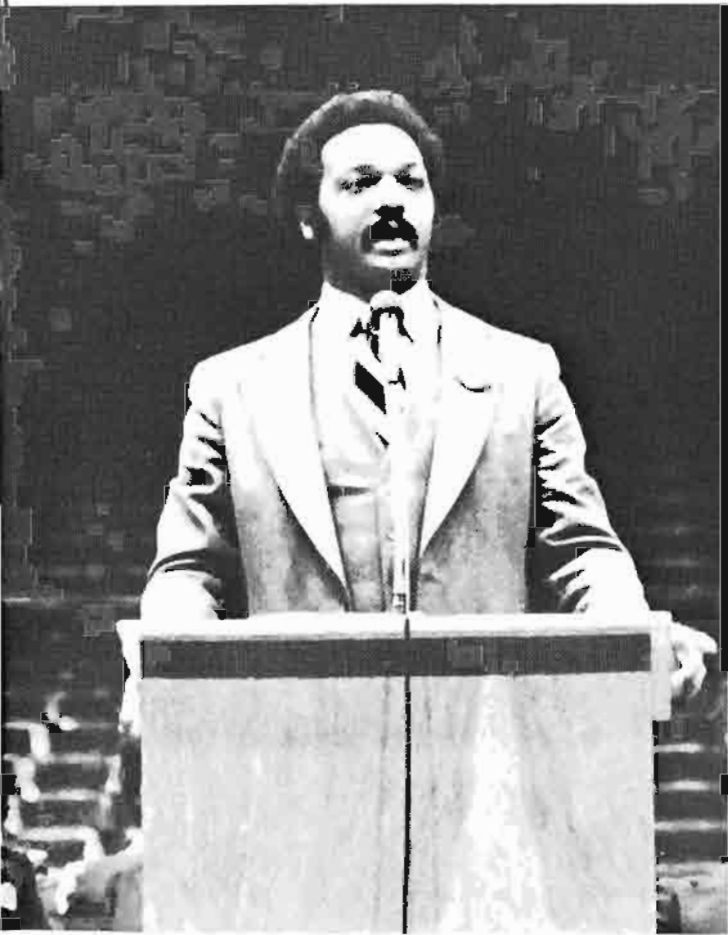


THE REVEREND JESSE JACKSON



"The world in the 1980's will experience a human rights renaissance," proclaimed the Reverend Jesse Jackson as he spoke to more than 3,000 people at the UD Arena Tuesday, January 8. The event at which Jackson spoke was co-sponsored by the UD Jaycees and Central State University. The 38 year old Baptist Minister went on to say, "There will be a radical redistribution of power. We must shift our interests from military power to a high sense of purpose." Black people, according to Jackson, will lead the challenge of living in new world order. Jackson said God has called the Blacks to save the world and that they will "take the rejected stone and make it the cornerstone."





WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



On Sunday March 23, 1980, a dream came true for the University of Dayton's Women's basketball team. To be number one in the nation, the Flyers beat the College of Charleston 83-53, and became the national champions of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women in the Division II. They reached this feat by defeating Louisiana 77-52 in the semi-finals.

Ending the regular season with a 32-2 record, the Women Flyers went on to win four post season games, for an overall record of 36-2. An early 2 point loss to Edinboro and a 3 point loss to Division I Northwestern, were the only losses suffered this season.

Highlights of the year included big wins over Division I schools, Ohio State, Moorehead, and the University of Detroit. Individual highlights include seniors Ann Meyers and Beverly Cruso receiving All-American Awards. Coach Maryalyce Jeremiah received The Coach of the Year award for the Division II.

A number of records were also broken by the 1980 Women Flyers. In the championship game, Ann Meyers scored 40 points to break the Dayton single scoring record. Ann also had the highest field goal percentage of 63%. Ann was also the only Flyer to score over 800 points in a season, and over 2000 points in a career.

The Flyers have the longest winning streak ever — 18 games and they haven't lost at home for three years. The 1980 season will also be remembered as the year of the most wins in a season — 36.

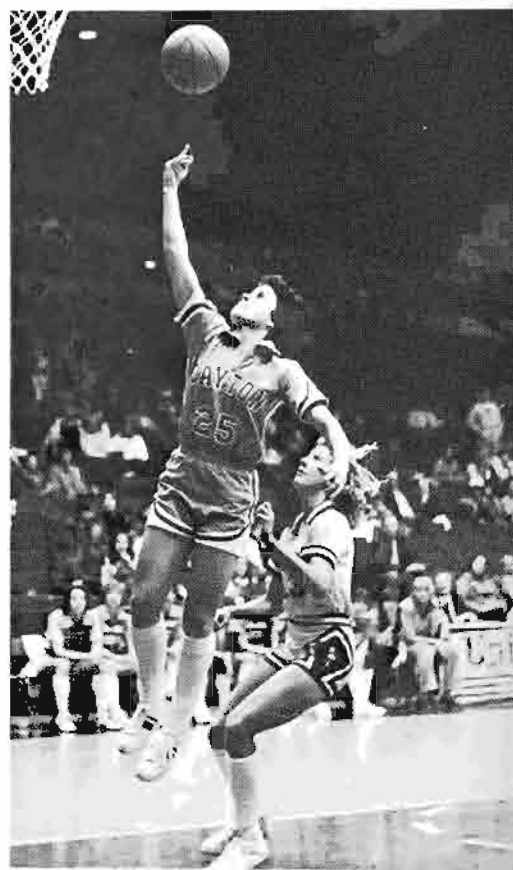
The Flyers will lose valuable players in seniors Ann Meyers, Journey Beard, and Beverly Cruso. But with a strong showing of underclassmen, and good recruiting, next seasons Women's basketball team shows as much promise as the 1980 Division II National Champions.

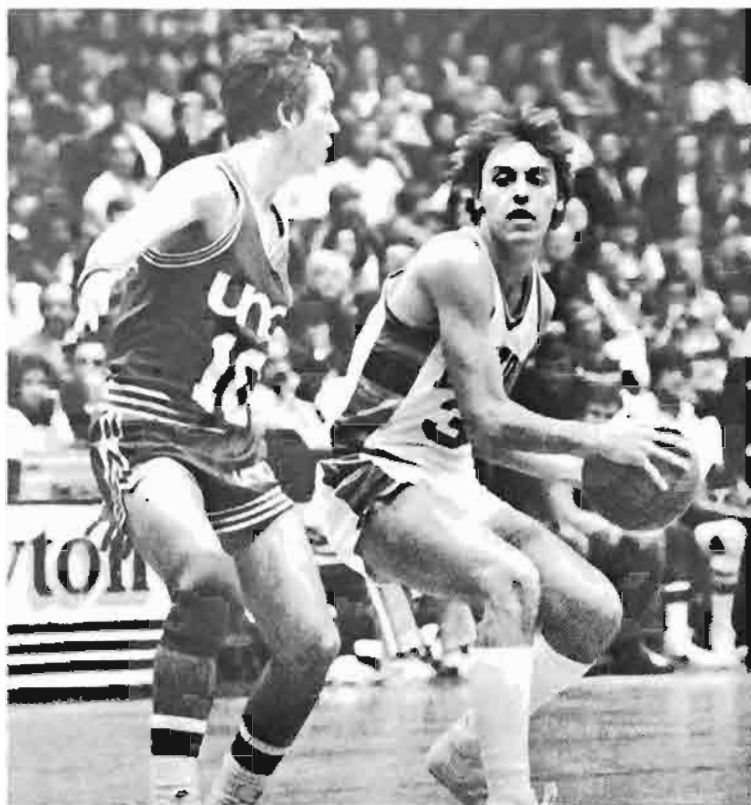
This year was a disappointing season for the Flyers, but with the loss of only two seniors and the addition of new recruiters, the Flyers may be back on top next year!

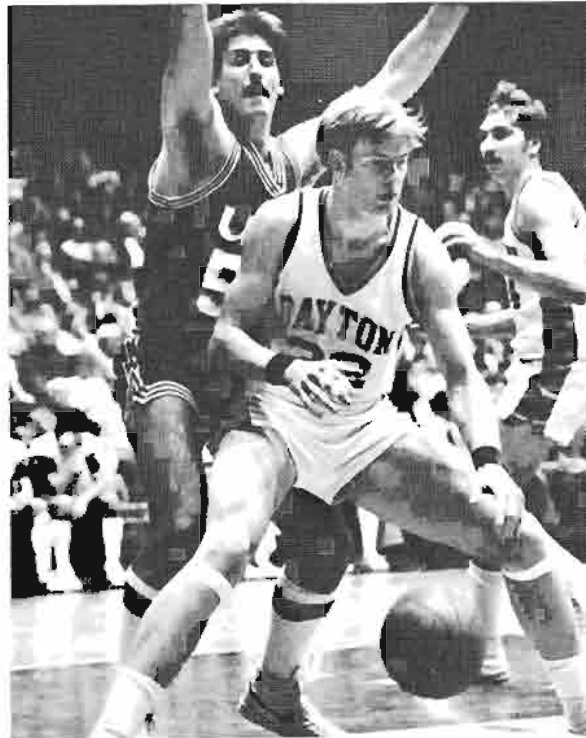
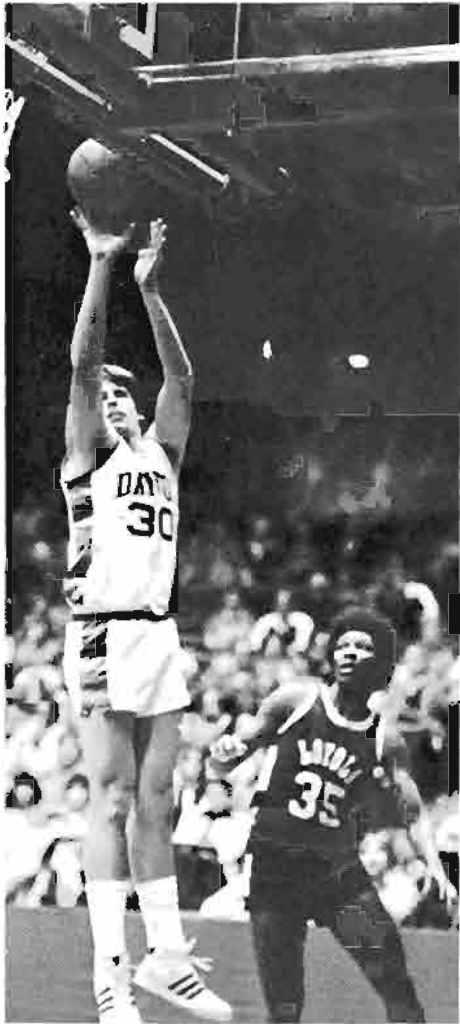
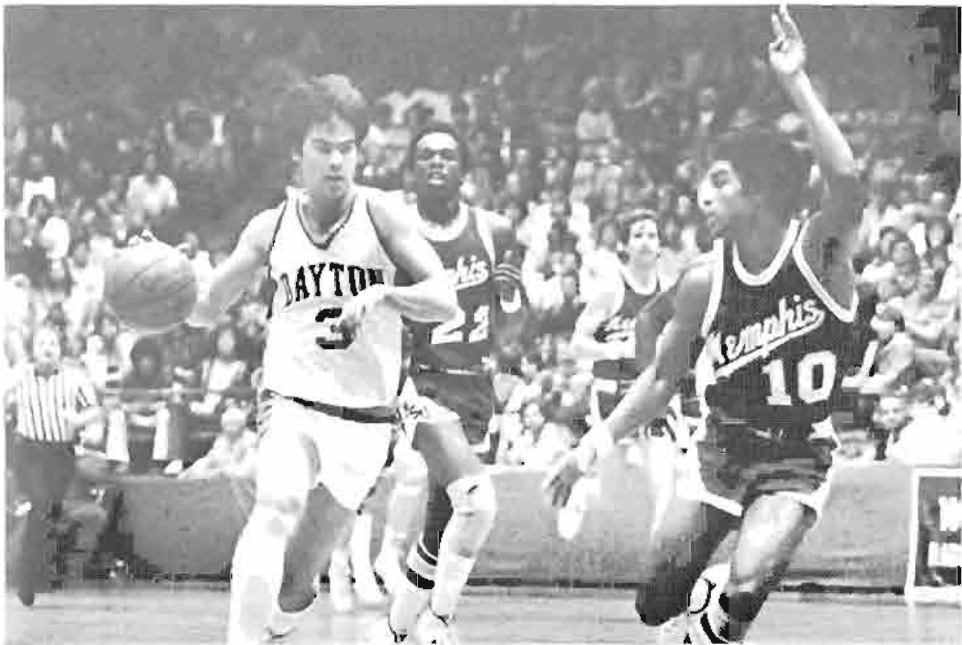

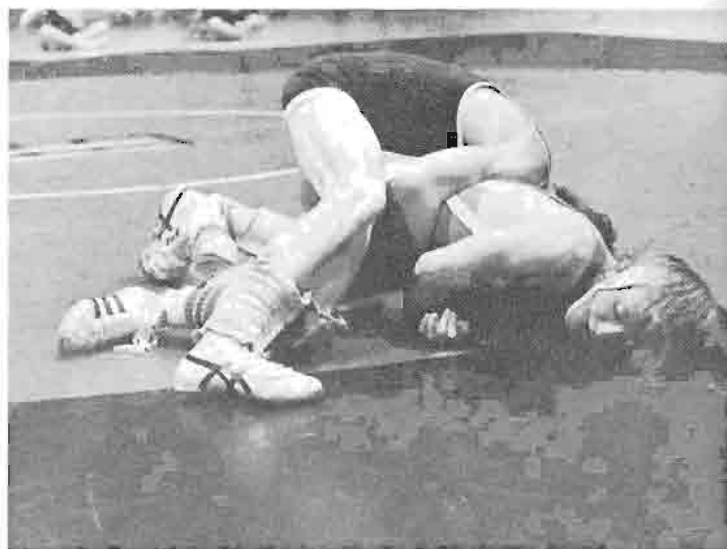
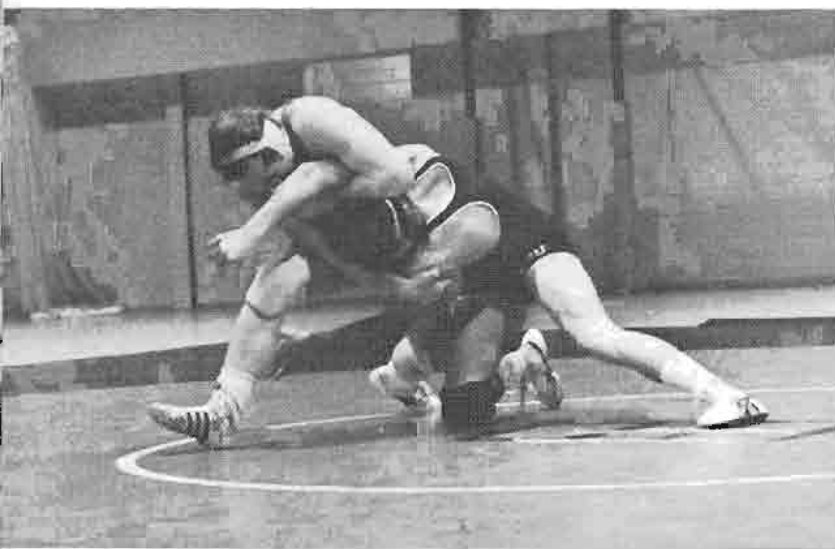




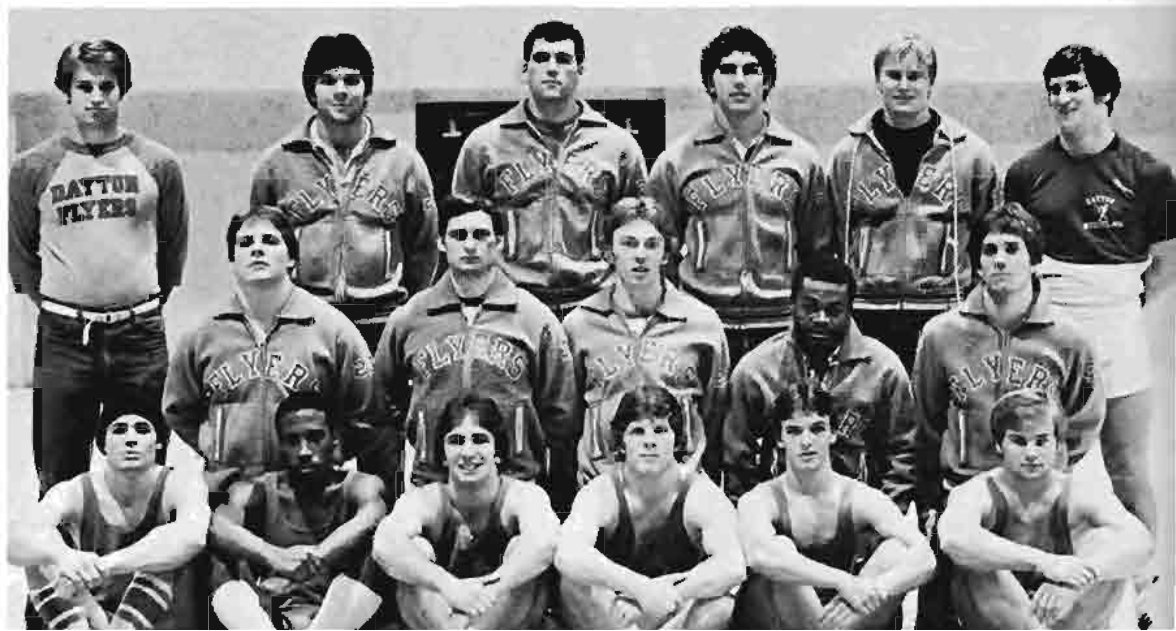
WRESTLING

— The production of *The Boyfriend*.

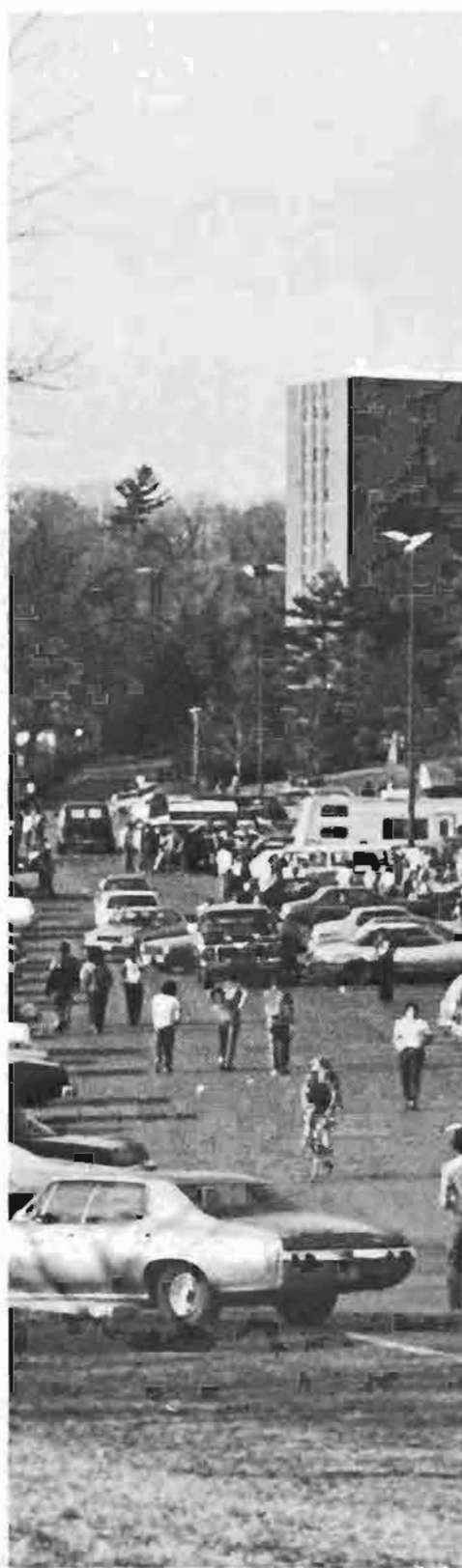
— St. Patrick's Day when leprechauns and other green people appeared on campus.

— Spring Festival which gave everyone the chance for one more good parking lot party before finals started.

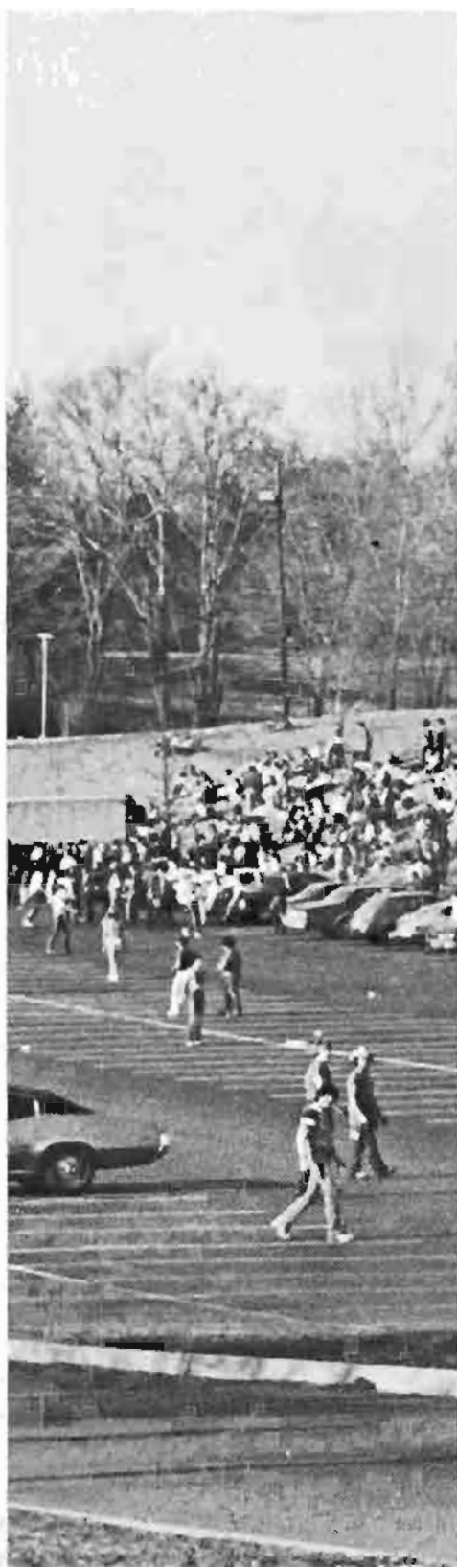

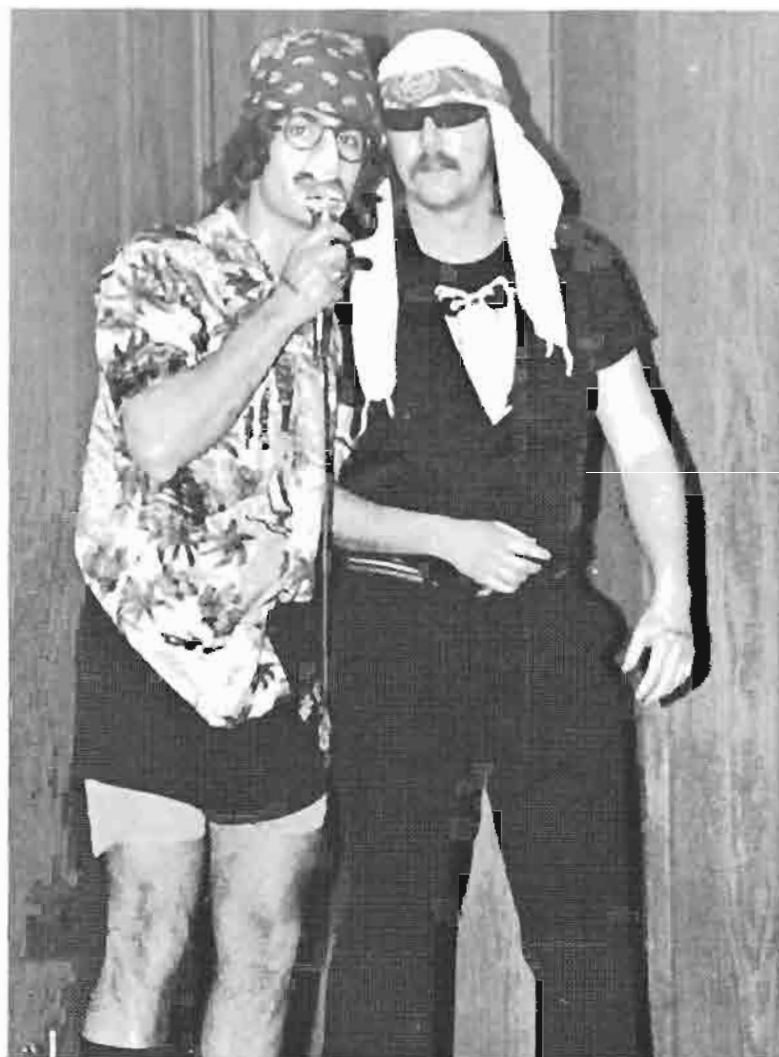

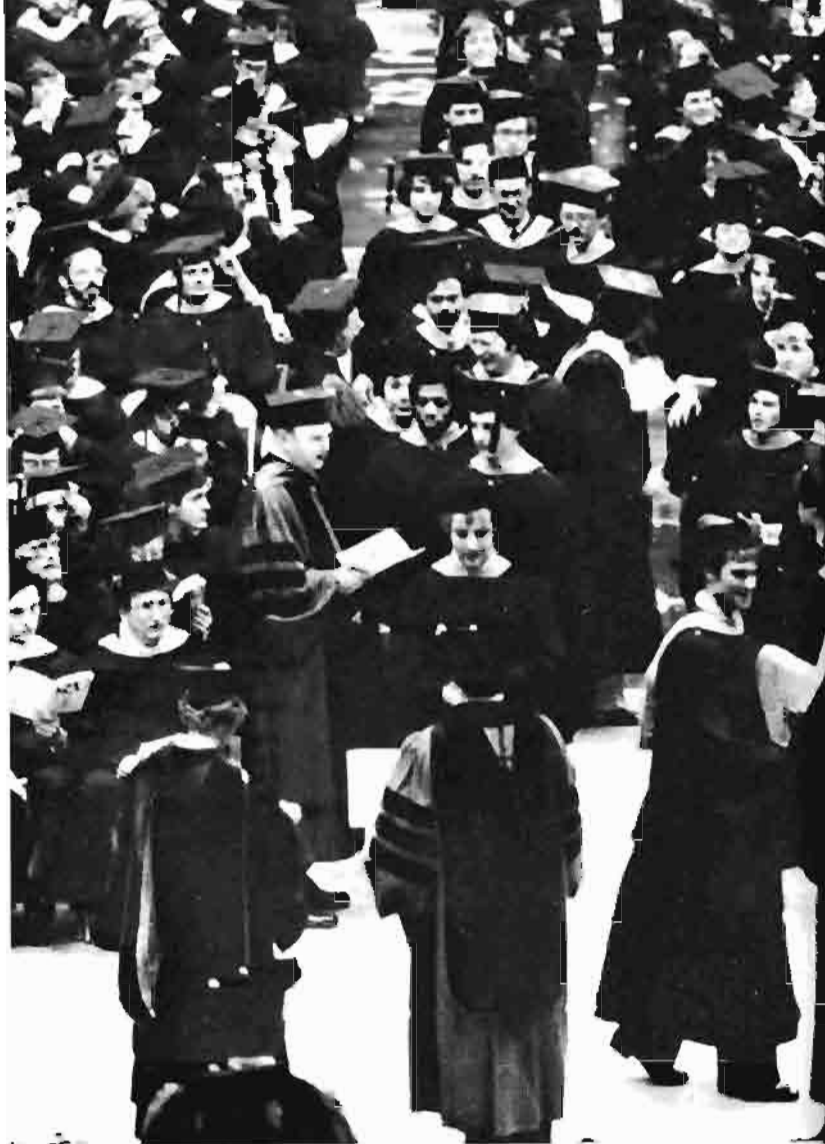

THE BOYFRIEND

This year's spring musical, *The Boyfriend*, proved more than a parody of the twenties. It is a pastiche, a group of crowded scenes acted with enormous vitality, in which the twenties are torn apart in much the same manner they were originally put together. Halfway through the mass, Fitz was given the presidential medallion and mace by John Torley, chairman of the UD Board of Trustees. In his presidential address following the mass Fitz spoke of the day as "a time of celebration, a celebration of the University of Dayton." He told the crowd of approximately 400 that UD had risen from adversity before and would continue to do so in the future. Citing four themes from the past which could be applied to the future, the new president spoke of scholarship, catholicism, UD's sense of family and community, and the growing ties between UD and the Dayton community. Tying these together, Fitz said, "We must create a story of the University which will be worth telling by future generations."

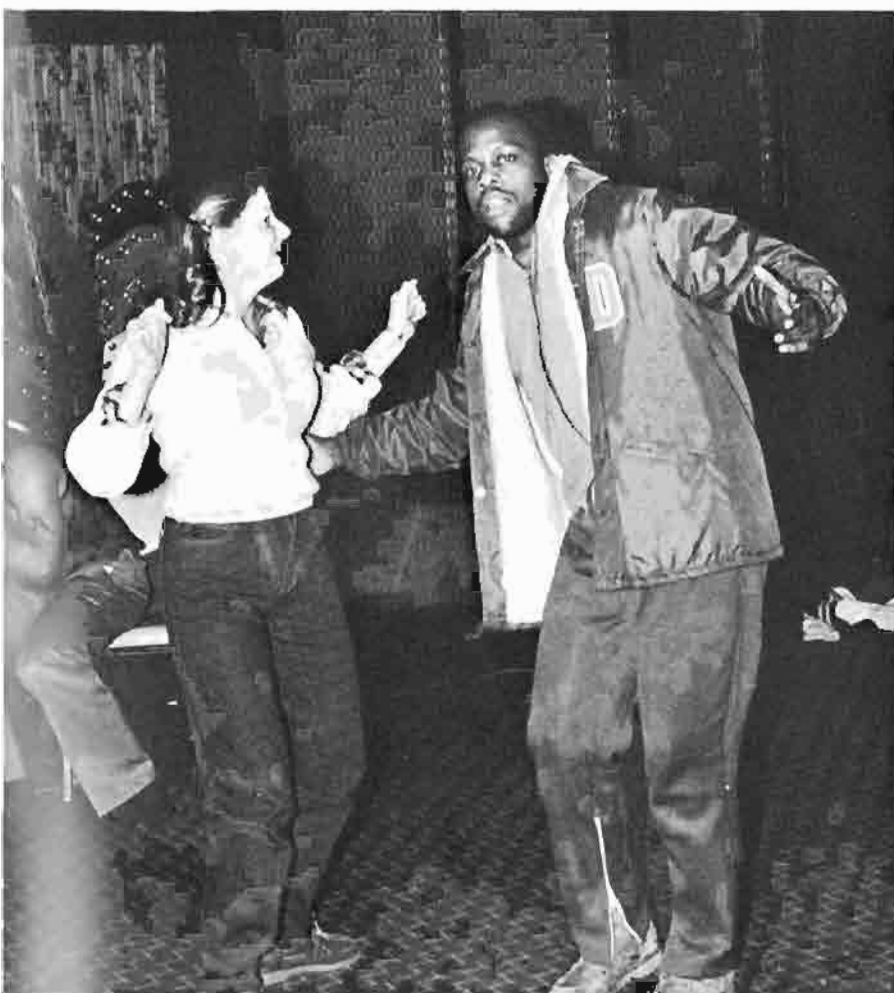

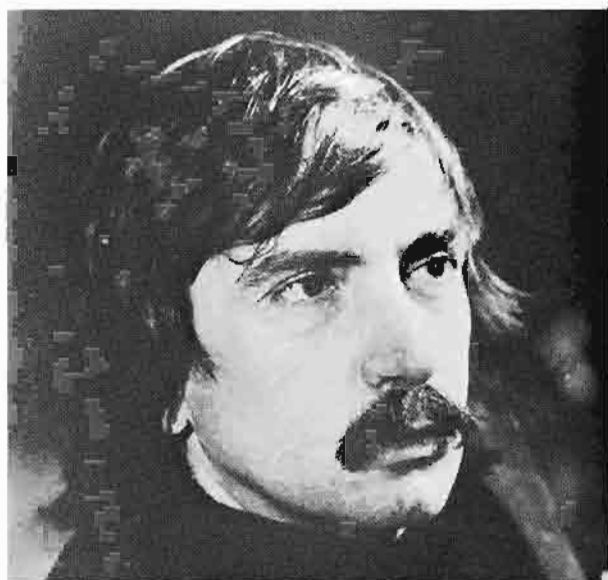




UNIVERSITY OF DAYTON ART SERIES

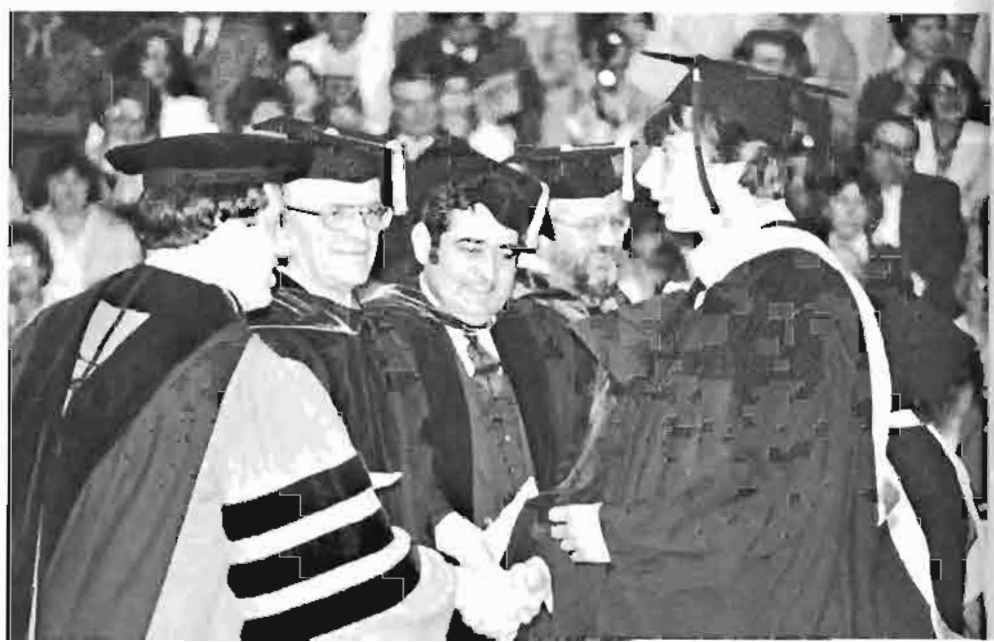

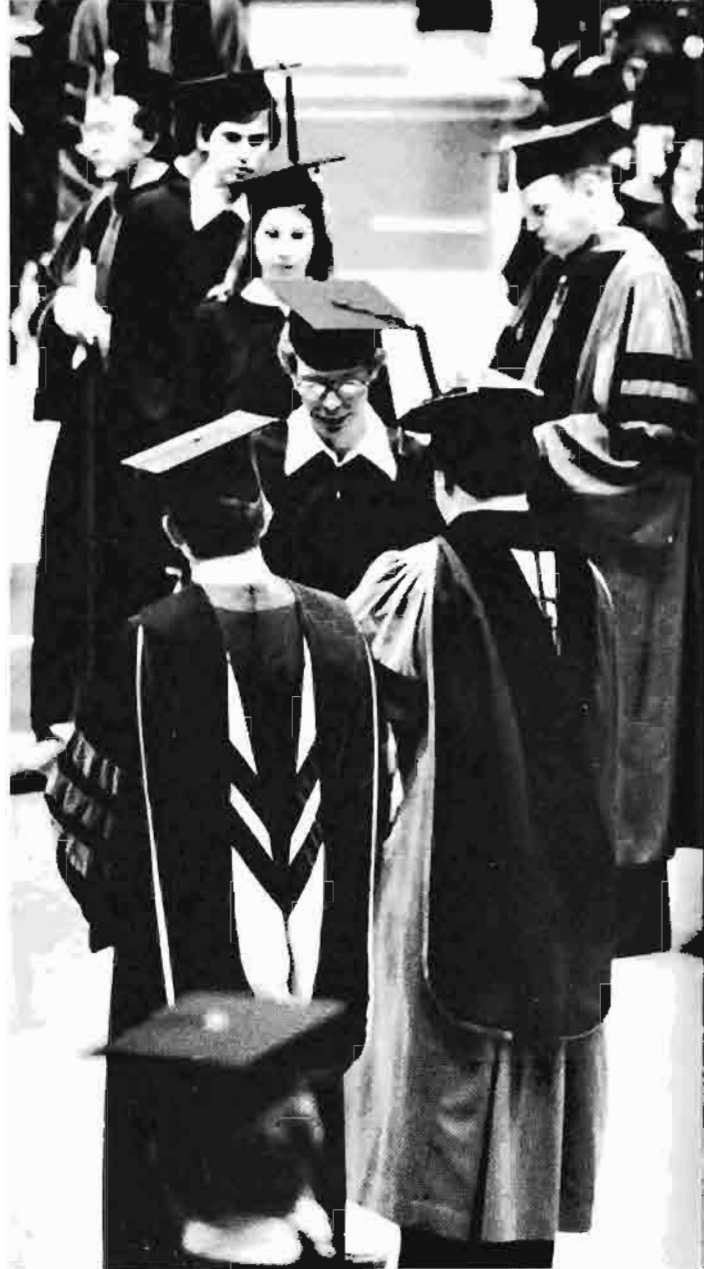
GRADUATION

Having lost several valuable seniors, the netters are concentrating on strengthening the underclassmen to make UD the top notch team it has the potential to be.



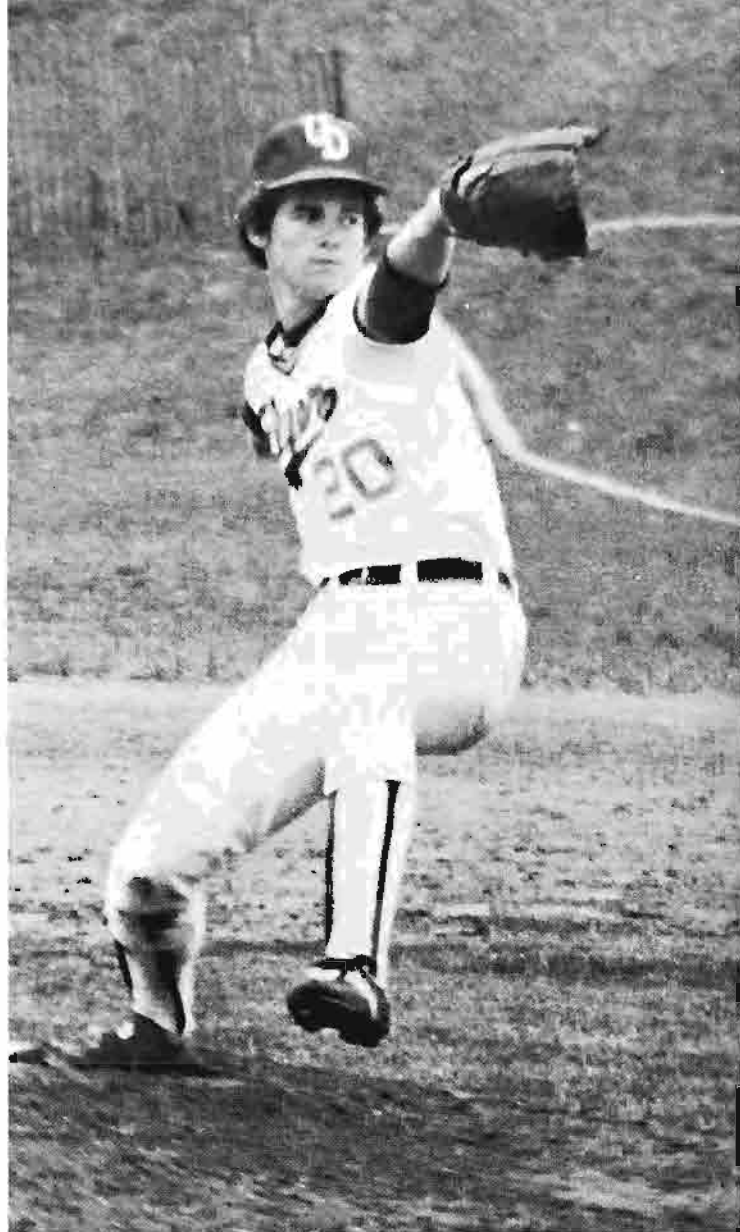


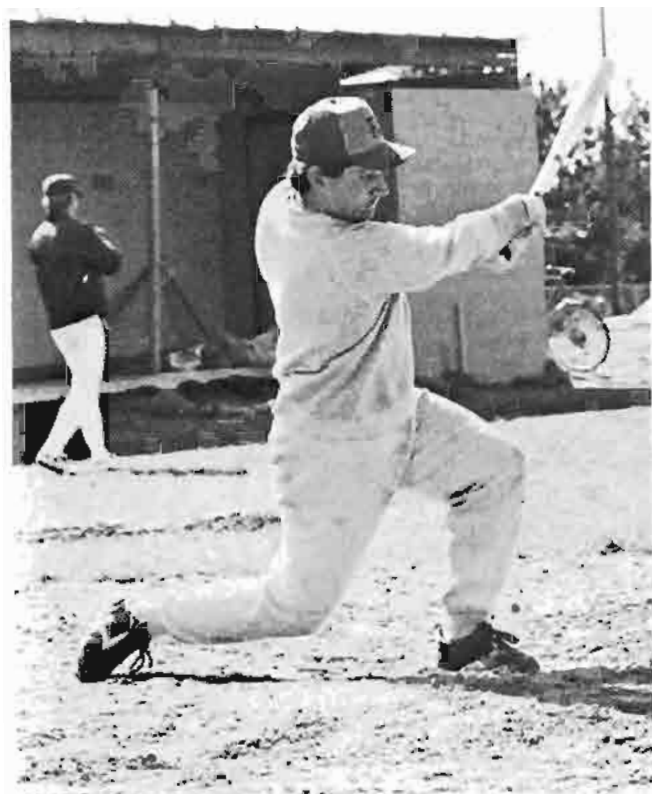
