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

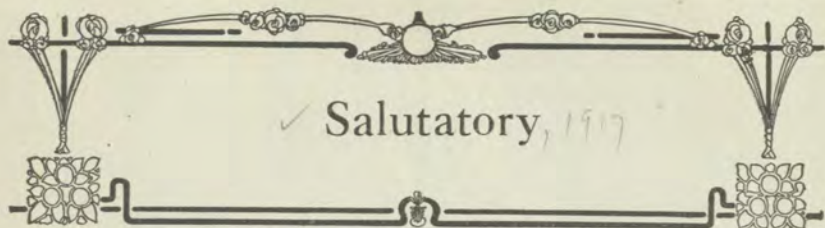
FOUNDER'S DAY



MY friends, many farewells have been spoken from this historic hall, but none of them have affected us as the parting emotions which at this moment surge within the hearts of the Class of Nineteen-Seventeen. Since the time is here, since Commencement Day with all its grandeur has come, the truth is brought home to us, that hearts, tied by the mutual bond of love and duty, can not be severed without pain. Yes; an indescribable emotion is within us, a feeling of joy and a sense of pain. We are happy because this day has been a glorious culmination of our college career. It has crowned our brows with the laurels of success. The goal of our ambition has been attained. The day we have hopefully awaited, since our first moment at college, has fulfilled in us our heart's desire. We regret that we must leave behind those we love, the scenes we cherish, and the sacred halls wherein we drank of wisdom's fount. But ere the few remaining moments become a memory of the past, we must stop to consider our duties as educated men and pay the tributes due.

interested. Ask the "workers" today, what is the cry of the "drones"? The "workers" will tell you that the "drones" say they have "no time." Yes; and the strange part of it is that the excuse has in it the greatest **appearance** of truth. But is it a good excuse? Let us see!

The trouble with the "drones" is this: they ask the indolent part of themselves, that part of man which St. Paul called the "old man," whether he wants to work. It is the "old man" who answers that he has "no time."

The individual who says he has "no time," means, that he is engaged with other work, and has for principle to finish one work completely before starting another. He is ignorant that an important means of saving time is the habit of changing the kind of work in which one is engaged. Men, whose opinion can not be brushed away with a mere sweep of the hand, maintain that "it is a mistake to plan that one piece of work shall be finished before another work is begun." They cite the judicious habit of artists,—to engage in a whole series of sketches, and to turn from one to the other as the spirit moves them, realizing that a change is almost as restful as complete rest. Moreover, it is a splendid way to find out whether one's better self has a disinclination to a special form of work, to which one might yield, or whether old Adam, the "old man," is exhibiting his disinclination to do any work at all.

Besides the trick of the "old man" in saying that he has "no time," there is something more to think about. The chief element in the art of having time to do things for the common good consists in banishing from one's life all superfluities. Among these superfluities we might mention: correspondence; excessive going to meetings, lectures and concerts; and lastly, excessive reading of newspapers, and an inordinate appetite for novels.

Most of the human wrecks of life are caused by having either no work, too little work, or uncongenial work. Happiness is not man's possession, unless the human heart beats peacefully in the natural activity of vigorous, yet satisfying work. There is but one note of warning to be sounded to safeguard the spiritual health of the "workers": guard against making of work an idol, instead of serving God through one's work.

It Happened in Xenia There is no excuse for not knowing the deeds of Prussian Militarism. The press has been full of its misdeeds. The world today is getting together, to work hand in hand, to crush the monster.

Numberless methods have been instituted to punish Prussian

Militarism. The Russians changed the name of St. Petersburg to Petrograd; the Canadians wiped out the name of Berlin from their soil and christened the fair farm lands with the noble name of Kitchener.

But it remained for one "burg" of these United States to inflict the body-blow, the "solar plexus" upon the giant, Prussian Militarism. The natives of this town of Ohio remembered that Prussian Militarism forbade the teaching of Polish in the "elementary schools" of Poland, and prohibited the teaching of French in the "elementary schools" of Alsace. Brave Xenia of Ohio clime has learned how to deal death blows from Prussian Militarism itself. Brave Xenia has promulgated that German, the language of the "Boche," shall no longer be taught in the schools within her confines.

We trust that Xenia will not be more ruthless than Prussian Militarism. Prussian Militarism allowed the teaching of the foreign tongues of Polish and French in the higher institutions of learning. So we hope that Xenia will permit, in her kindness of heart, to tolerate the teaching of German in her High School and her colored supplement of Wilberforce.

We are observing. We noticed that it was shortly after the promulgation of the Xenia Decree that the Hindenberg line got a kink in it; that the Germans lost heart; that the British and French were able not only to hold the German hordes back, but to make them beat a hasty retreat.

All hail to Xenia! Like their brave historic ancestor, every native can exclaim with pride: "I was born in X-zemia; I lived in X-zemia; and I will die in X-zemia!"

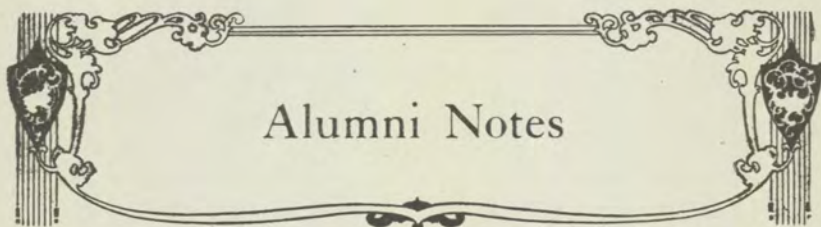
Go Forth

NEED COLLEGE MEN

"Lawrence Montanus, who delivered the salutatory, dwelt at length on the need of college-bred men in the nation's call to arms today. He paid a glowing tribute to Hon. Warren Gard, Third Congressional District of Ohio, as the able representative of the district in the hour of the nation's need. His delivery was most pleasing and happy throughout.

"Hon. Warren Gard followed with the commencement address.

"Rev. Bernard P. O'Reilly, President of the College, delivered a short address, in which he dwelt on the characteristic importance of the commencement this year, the raising of funds for the Mechanical Engineering Department, the donation of prizes for studies, and the message to colleges from the Bureau of Education from Washington, D. C. He informed the large gathering that the year of 1917 marks the centenary of the foundation of the Society of Mary, the members of which have taught at St. Mary College for the past sixty-seven years.

"President O'Reilly insisted on the importance of the Mechanical Engineering Fund, which is being raised to complete the equipment in the Mechanical Engineering laboratories. He reviewed the introduction of military training under Captain J. O. Donovan, and stated that military training will become part of the curriculum of the studies at St. Mary College.

"The need of an auditorium and a gymnasium was insisted upon, the audience voicing their approval of the need of these two buildings.

MEMORIAL TRIBUTE

"In paying tribute to the donors of medals and cash prizes, Father O'Reilly paid a glowing tribute to Dr. D. R. Reilly, recently deceased, whom he said left a monument to his memory when he left St. Mary College a permanent endowment for oratory. In closing his address, President O'Reilly addressed the student-body, informing them that the Bureau of Education of the United States Government at Washington, D. C., had sent a call to the college presidents of the country, requesting them to inform the student-body of the colleges that the best services that they can perform for their country is to re-enlist in the ranks of the colleges as students during the coming year, that they may become more efficient as medical, engineering or agricultural men in the needful services for their country in the imminent needs today.

"At the conclusion of the awarding of medals and diplomas, and the conferring of degrees, which were announced by the Vice President of the College, Rev. Joseph Tetzlaff, S. M., the valedictory was delivered by George R. Kinstle, of Dayton, Ohio. His valedictory was a masterful message, insisting on the evils of present-day materialistic, affirmative education, prevalent in many of the large colleges and universities in the country.

"The singing of the College song, 'St. Mary College March,' brought to a close a most eventful year at the College, the most successful year in the history of the local institution."

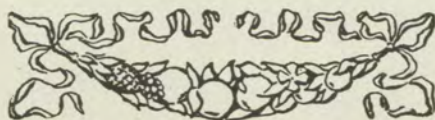

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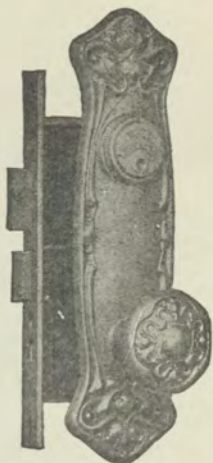

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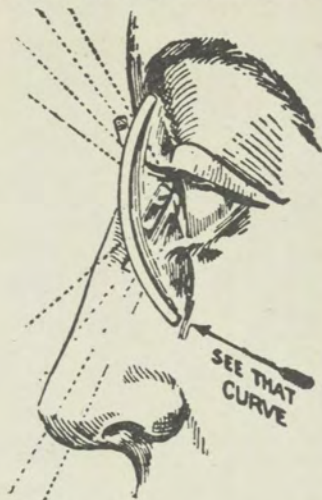
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
