The final military review and competitive drills will be held the last week in May.

Flyer Swordsmen Win Novice Honors in Fencing Meet

Before the largest crowd that has ever attended a fencing meet in Dayton, University of Dayton sword artists exhibited their agility on the strip, along with entrants from Ohio State and Cincinnati, by taking novice honors in a tournament staged by the Ohio Fencers' league at the Biltmore hotel, April 29.

Bill Beekman, Flyer representative, so cunningly matched wits with all his adversaries that he succeeded in winning three medals in the novice section of sword play. First place in sabre, second place in epee, and third in foil were the honors bestowed upon the university swordsman. Concluding Dayton's victories in the novice class, Larry Libecap gained recognition by taking the second award in sabre.

Junior honors were not, however, in order for the Hilltop outfit. The battle was left up entirely to the fencers from Ohio State and Cincinnati. All awards in foil went to the State school duelists, whose strength was exemplified in the personage of Prof. Royal Snow, champion foilsman at the meet. First honors in epee and sabre went to Sawyer and D'Amore, respectively, who also were members of the Columbus squad.
