

# Free Clinics are Losing Funding

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## What is a Free Clinic?

- A healthcare facility in the United States that offers low cost or no cost visits and treatments for patients who are underinsured.
- Permit patients to seek care from a provider
- Receive laboratory or radiographic services if necessary (Darnell, 2010).
- In order to be able to provide such services Free Clinics depend upon donations and partnerships to fund their practices
- Often do not receive any state or government funding (Birs, 2016).

## Reach Out

- Utilizes the professional skills of volunteer health care professionals to provide the underserved/underinsured Dayton population with free access to health care services
- Provides an alternative to emergency room visits for minor illnesses and chronic conditions (Reach Out, 2019).

## Why it Matters

- Despite the passage of the Affordable Care Act, an estimated 31 million Americans will still remain without healthcare coverage (Birs,2016).
- NAFC reports a 40% increase in patient demand for services from free clinics for everything from pediatric vaccinations to long-term management of diabetes among the adult population (Birs,2016).
- Poor health is directly correlated to low socioeconomic status (Demeria, 2016).
- 60-70% of the underserved/uninsured patients in the US are chronically ill, complex patients, one of the "sickest" populations (Demeria, 2016).



## Loss of Funding


- The National Association of Free and Charitable Clinics has reported an overall 20% decrease in clinic funding (Birs, 2016).
- A free clinic in Florida reports experiencing a budget cut as their clinic lost a 3-year grant that would have provided \$100,000 in funding (Fantozzi, 2015).
- Reach Out experienced a fund loss that left a 21% decrease in their typical budget (2017 Annual Report).
- Partnerships with Montgomery County Human Service Levy (HSL) and United Way (UW) of Greater Dayton Area were terminated (2017 Annual Report)
