STRATEGIES

- Don't limit your students learning
- Ask your students questions about the lesson content as you are teaching
 - Not yes or no questions
- Be patient with your students especially when communicating
- Teach one lesson at a time, don't jumble up information making it harder for the student to concentrate on the content
- Assess the pace that you are teaching on students needs
- Observe your students learning styles
- Use visuals
- If the student is doing an assignment by themselves have them describe to themselves and you what they are doing as they are learning
- Be patient
- Validate your students and their learning
- Create a positive learning environment
- Encourage group work
- Set goals
- Adjust difficulty levels
- Believe in your students and their capabilities
