DAYTON, Ohio, September 23, 1966 --- Father Matthew Kohmescher, S.M., Chairman of the Department of Theology at the University of Dayton, has announced the addition of eight faculty members to his department staff.

Father Remi Baumann, a native of Epfendorf, Germany, comes to UD from the White Fathers Seminary in Onchiota, New York. He received his B.A. from the Gymnasium Linz on the Rhine in 1929 and continued his studies at the Seminaries of Philosophy and Theology in Trier. From 1940-1948 Father Baumann taught at the White Fathers Minor Seminary in Ujiji, Tanzania, E. Africa. He is now an instructor of theology at the University of Dayton.

Brother Leo John Murray, S.M., who was born in Stratford on the Avon, Ontario, Canada, comes to UD from Chaminade High School where he was chairman of the department of religion. Prior to this he had taught at Holy Trinity High School, Brooklyn, N.Y., Hamilton Catholic High School; Cathedral Latin High School in Cleveland, Ohio; and North Catholic High School in Pittsburgh, Pa. Brother Murray received his B.S. in Education from the University of Dayton; his M.A. from the Catholic University of America; and continued his studies at St. John Lateran in Rome, Italy; Duquesne University in Pittsburgh; and Cleveland College, Cleveland, Ohio.

Father Francis Keenan, S.M., who received degrees from UD, Fordham University and Johns Hopkins University, is now an Instructor of Theology at the University of Dayton. Father Keenan taught in Baltimore Maryland from 1963-1966.

Father Sydney Byron Mutch of the White Fathers has studied at Gannon College, Erie, Pa.; Our Lady of River Ridge Seminary, Franklin, Pa.; the White Father Scholasticate, Carthage, Tunisia; and the Catholic University of America. He comes to UD from St. Joseph's Seminary in Onchiota, New York.

William Doane Kelly, a Ph.D. from New York City, comes to UD from the University of Montreal. He received his B.A. from St. Peter's College in 1954; his M.A. in theology from St. John's University in 1960; his Ph.D. from the University of Ottawa in 1964; and has done post-doctoral work at the State University of Iowa and the University of Pennsylvania. Mr. Kelly has been published in Commonweal (January, 1966),



and while at the University of Pennsylvania was on a post-doctoral fellowship for research in Biblical and Ecumenical Theology. Now an Assistant Professor in UD's Department of Theology, Mr. Kelly's past teaching experience includes work at Notre Dame College of Staten Island; the University of Ottawa; Fordham University; State University of Iowa; Loyola College of Montreal; La Salle College; the University of Pennsylvania; St. Edmund's Seminary, St. Michael's College, and the University of Montreal.

Miss Barbara Jeanne Crabb who is working on her Masters Degree in Theology from Marquette University, received her B.A. in Philosophy from St. Norbert College in West De Pere, Wisconsin. Miss Crabb is an instructor in the UD Department of Theology.

Miss Phylis A. Dissek who received her B.A. in English from D'Youville College in 1963 and her M.A. in Theology from Marquette University in 1966 comes to UD from St. Louis University. Now at UD, Miss Dissek is an instructor in the Department of Theology.

Peter John Fellenz comes to UD from McGuinness High School in Oklahoma City. He received his B.S. in Math from St. Norbert College in 1962, and his M.A. from Marquette University in 1965. A member of Delta Epsilon Sigma, Mr. Fellenz also taught at Reedsville High School in Reedsville, Wisconsin. He is now an instructor in the Department of Theology at the University of Dayton.

Three graduate students who are on assistantships in Theology are also teaching that department's staff. They are: Jim Adams, John Apczynski and Alan Andolsen.
