DAYTON, Ohio, November 23, 1966 --- John B. Kleinschmidt of Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, one of the Peace Corps members who had to leave Indonesia in 1965, and Patricia B. MacMahon of LaCrosse, Wisconsin, will serve as Peace Corps recruiters at the University of Dayton during the week of November 28 through December 2. The pair will have their headquarters in the Cafeteria/Snack Bar area of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Union.

Kleinschmidt, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, was one of 15 sports specialist-coaches sent to Indonesia in 1964 to train junior and senior high school boys in all types of sports. Kleinschmidt coached basketball and water polo during his year's stay in Indonesia.

After the departure from Indonesia, Kleinschmidt went to Nyasaland, now Malawi, where he served as a regional sports organizer. He and three other Peace Corps volunteers from Indonesia organized regional competition and also gave basketball and track and field clinics. These clinics were designed for secondary school and college students in three Malawi regions. They also helped to construct sports fields.

Miss MacMahon worked in rural community development and health in a small Honduras town from 1964 through this summer. Her primary activities were in the field of health and nutrition, setting up child feeding centers under CARE.
