DAYTON, Ohio, January 9, 1968 --- Frederic Storaska, a resident of North Carolina, is an expert on karate, judo and ju jitsu, and teaches women to protect themselves against men with improper motives. Mr. Storaska, who has a first degree black belt in karate and second degree brown belts in judo and ju jitsu, will lecture at the University of Dayton on "The Prevention of Assaults on Women" Wednesday, January 17.

Under the sponsorship of UD's Central Women's Organization, Mr. Storaska will present two lectures at 12:30 p.m. in the Kennedy Union Ballroom and at 7:30 p.m. in the O'Leary Auditorium, Miriam Hall.

Mr. Storaska, who has lectured to 46,000 women in 62 colleges in the east, south and midwest during the past six years, is a continuing student at North Carolina State University where he is majoring in abnormal and social psychology. Besides his lectures he has been teaching karate, judo and ju jitsu to law enforcement people in the south and east. He is the founder and owner of the Bushido Karate Schools Inc. in Raleigh, North Carolina.

"I don't believe in attempting to teach women to be soldiers," says Mr. Storaska, "but they should learn to defend themselves from violent assault by utilization of various "pressure" points as well as a formidable kick. My program is not to teach them how to fight their way out of assault situations, but instead, to teach them how to prevent the assault situations from materializing."
