DAYTON, Ohio, October 19, 1971 --- Joseph J. Jova, United States Ambassador to the Organization of American States, and Sol M. Linowitz, former Ambassador to UAO, will join Dr. Eduardo Frei, Montalva, former President of the Republic of Chile, at the two-week (November 2-15) Foreign Affairs Seminar: "The Challenge of Chile," at the University. The program, designed to explore the whole spectrum of life in Latin America, will be held weekdays from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the University's Kennedy Union building and is sponsored by the Special Sessions Department in cooperation with the Office of International Education.

The program is designed for university and high school students, businessmen, governmental employees as well as housewives to enable the American public to understand what is taking place in Chile and Latin America, particularly since a Communist was elected President of Chile last fall.

The seminar is so structured that a person either attending school or working may take in the main sections of the two-week lecture series. All lectures, including the five by Frei-Montalva, will be held after the dinner hour in the Kennedy Union. A person can attend the entire seminar for \$30 tuition which entitles him to attend all the special programs, or he can attend the lectures individually for \$1.75 a lecture.

University students' fee is \$5 for the entire program. The University of Dayton History Department has structured a course within this two-week period which will enable a student to receive a full semester credit. Call the department for information at 229-2848.

Jova and Linowitz will join at least seven other men who have either been active in Latin American affairs, or are residents of Latin America. The others are Carlos Mantilla-Ortega, Ambassador of Ecuador; Reynaldo Galindo Pohl, Ambassador of El Salvador to the United Nations; E. R. Richardson, Ambassador of Jamaica; George L-P Weaver, Special Assistant of International Labor Office, United Nations; Lester Ziffren, former General Public Relations Director, The Anaconda Copper Company; Jan Phaff Steen, International Banking Division, Winter's National Bank; and Congressman Charles Whalen Jr.

These men will serve as lecturers, panelists and resource persons during the two-week seminar.

The seminar will principally involve general questions on Latin America, but Dr. Frei and other experts will pinpoint Christian Democracy and its place in the world, the Organization of American States, the Rockefeller Report and other programs which currently are a source of concern for the United States government in its relationship with the "other" American continent.

Particularly will the program touch on a subject offered by Clodomiro Almeyda, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Chile, when he stated that the Organization of American States maintains two fundamental fictions. "The first fiction is to suppose that the OAS comprises 23 equal states; the second fiction is to suppose that there is a great homogeneity among the states which presumably have the same interests, goals, and ideals...."
