DAYTON, Ohio, June 26, 1972--Dr. Robert Noland, Ph.D., ~~Associate~~
Professor of Psychology at the University of Dayton, died today after a short
illness. Dr. Noland, who was 44, died in St. Elizabeth Medical Center following
surgery last week.

A resident of Dayton since 1953 when he joined the University as a guidance
counselor, Dr. Noland has been most active in recent years in mental health and
psychiatric and psychological consulting. He was coordinator of the Adolescent
Treatment Program at the Dayton Mental Health Center and a consultant with the
Psychiatric & Psychological Center of South Dayton.

Besides the above he served in consulting positions with other agencies, pro-
fessional groups and business organizations during the 1950s and 1960s. He
served as a consultant for General Motors and other automotive companies in
Detroit for several years.

He was the author of five books, edited four others and contributed many
articles to professional journals. Dr. Noland also was in demand as a lecturer
particularly in the field of mental health and with handicapped children and their
parents, and served as consultant and lecturer for seminars and workshops in
Dayton and at the University of Notre Dame and Nazareth College.

Dr. Noland was assistant editor of the Ohio Psychologist journal from 1966
to 1968 and was chairman of the Psychology Division of the Ohio Academy of Science
in 1967 and 1968. He also was a member of the American Midwest and Ohio
Psychological associations.

He is a 1952 graduate of the University of Detroit from where he also received
his master's degree, both in psychology. He was awarded his doctorate in counseling
and psychology from the University of Cincinnati in 1966.

Dr. Noland leaves his wife, Mary Jane, and four children, Mrs. Roger
(Catherine) Robinson of Dayton, and Christopher, 16; Robert Lee, Jr., 14; and
Amy, 6, all at home.

The family requests that in lieu of flowers, contri utions be made to Robert
Noland Fund at the First National Bank, 628 Watervliet Avenue. The Fund will be
devoted to the development of the Adolescent Treatment Unit of the Dayton Mental
Health Center.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Meyer & Boehmer with burial
in Calvary Cemetery.
