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DAYTON, Ohio, January 6, 1972 --- Dr. Dale Goldhaber of the University of Dayton's Department of Psychology has been awarded a federal grant of \$4,800 for his project, "Seminar on Intervention Research With Children." The program, with the grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare through the Ohio Board of Regents, begins April 1 and runs through December 31.

Five organizations in the Dayton area are serving as cooperating agencies in the project. They are the Dayton Urban League, Montgomery County Community Action Agency, Sinclair Community College, Miami Valley Child Development Centers Inc., and Model Neighborhood Community Center, Inc.

Dr. Goldhaber, whose special field is child psychology, says seminar participants will require knowledge and increased competence in: 1. Psychological bases for using pre-school enrichment as an antidote for cultural deprivation; 2. Ethical issues involved in the design administration, and evaluation of intervention programs; 3. Psychological and methodological factors involved in the design and evaluation of intervention programs; 4. Psychological and methodological factors involved in the design and evaluation of "follow-through" programs; and 5. Factors involved in the selection and training of intervention personnel.

Dr. Goldhaber, who has been with the University of Dayton since 1969, has a bachelor's degree from Roosevelt University and master's and doctoral degrees from Syracuse University. He taught at Syracuse for three years before coming to Dayton.
