**DAYTON, Ohio, September 8, 1986** -- Former President Gerald Ford will speak at the University of Dayton Arena on Tuesday, September 16, at 7:30 p.m. His talk, entitled "The Constitution Two Hundred Years Later: Is It Working?," is free and open to the public.

Ford is the first speaker in a special lecture series commemorating the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. The series will include six programs held between September 16 and March 19.

The event is funded by L. M. Berry and Company, Philips Industries, NCR Corporation, the Runnymede Foundation, Dayton Bar Association, the Dayton Foundation, Mead Corporation, the University of Dayton and its Distinguished Speakers' Series, and the Ohio Humanities Council, a state-based agency of the National Endowment for the Humanities that makes grants to non-profit organizations in Ohio for public programs in the humanities.
