IRISH HISTORIAN  
TO SPEAK AT UD

## *News Release*

DAYTON, Ohio, September 17, 1987--David Noel Doyle, an Irish historian, will speak at the University of Dayton on Wednesday, September 30, at 7:30 p.m. in Kennedy Union 311-12. His talk will focus on American history and is sponsored by UD's History Department and the UD Irish Club.

Doyle's presentation, "The Irish and the American Constitution," will examine the influence of Irish American and Ulster American elements throughout the history of the United States. He will show how these influences affected the revolutionary period, the forming of the Constitution, and the development of the freedoms promised in the Constitution.

Doyle is presently in the United States as a part of the Irish American Cultural Institute's Irish Perceptions Series. Doyle received his undergraduate degree from Queen's College in Belfast. After graduating, he came to the United States in 1966, earned his master's degree from Marquette University and his doctorate degree from the University of Iowa. He taught for a year at Loyola University in Chicago. A past president of the Irish Association of American Studies, Doyle has taught American history at University College in Dublin since 1973.

The books Doyle has written or co-authored include Irish Americans, Native Rights and National Empires, America and Ireland, 1776-1976, The Irish Americans (in 42 volumes), and Ireland, Irishmen and Revolutionary America.
