The Social Practice of Human Rights is a biennial conference for human rights scholars and practitioners to foster greater self-reflection and constructive critique within the human rights community.

SPHR17 explores challenges to advocacy posed by racism, xenophobia, other forms of extremism and what Pope Francis has termed “the globalization of indifference.” The conference will feature four keynote addresses and four plenary dialogues focusing on the need for new strategies to confront interconnected human rights challenges that have taken on alarming dimensions of the conflict and challenges of **peace**, **forced migration** and **modern-day slavery**.

The program will include nearly 100 original presentations by scholars and practitioners from across the disciplinary spectrum capturing important trends in human rights research.

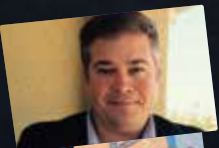

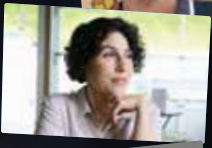
